Should be Made An Example of.
Thereby it looked somewhat as if the government did not intend to entirely ignore the law concerning the sale of liquor to Indians; but that one man at least would be brought to justice. How ever, so far, it has turned out rather unfavorable for the justice side, as the culprit succeeded in escaping before the officers got their hands on him.
It seems that on the 20th of last month a stage driver by the name of McHenry, who drives between The Dalles and Wapinitia and for passengers an Indian man and squaw, staying on his person a good supply of fire water he proceeded to get them both drunk, succeeding, however, only in the case of the man, as the woman refused to drink. More serious charges were also preferred against him of sexual assault upon the woman, but sufficient evidence could not be secured to warrant his arrest on that charge.
A complaint was sent to officers here, who in turn informed the U. S. officers, and Tuesday evening Deputy U. S. Marshal A. Roberts arrived in the city to arrest him. Atty. Mays was also here regarding the case. But when the marshal started out to secure his man yesterday morning, the bird had flown, although it is said he was here the evening previous.
What efforts are being made to secure him we have not learned, but it is to be hoped he will not be allowed to escape, altogether; but that an example will be made in his case, particularly so when other charges of a more serious nature could not be proven sufficient to convict.

NOTICE TO PATRONS.
Under the provisions of the registration law all persons when registering are required to furnish to the registering officer the following information:
If naturalized, the time, place, and court of naturalization. In this connection, it is necessary to produce naturalization papers, or declaration of intention.
Residence must be specific, giving

precinct, section, township and range; if within town or city, the street, No. if any, and No. of lot and block; if in any building where rooms are numbered, the number of the room and floor must be given.
In order to avoid unnecessary delay and inconspicuous, every person desiring to register should be prepared to furnish the above information.
Facilities will be furnished in every precinct in the county by either Justice of the Peace or Notary Public.

In accordance with the provisions of an act entitled "An act submitting to the election of the State of Oregon, in the general election to be held on the 1st Monday in June, 1895, the proposed Constitutional Amendments," approved February 10, 1893, it is hereby ordered by the Executive Department of the State of Oregon, as certified to by the Secretary of State, in the following manner:
1. The said amendments to be printed in a newspaper published in the seventh judicial district of the State of Oregon.
2. Dated at the Capitol, at Salem, Oregon, this 21st day of November, A. D. 1893.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4.
Resolved by the Senate, the House concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:
That section 1 of article 31 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and the same is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows:
SECTION 31.
Section 1. No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose, except as provided in this section, exceeding five per centum of the value of the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.
Adopted by the Senate, January 9, 1893.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5.
Resolved by the Senate, the House concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:
SECTION 5.
The Legislative Assembly may provide for the election of surrogate and circuit judges in districts of any size, or in counties containing less than five hundred of the taxable property, which shall be appointed by the court of the county or city, and the other judges shall be appointed by the court of the county or city, without reference to the taxable property therein to be ascertained by the last assessment for State and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.
Adopted by the Senate, February 15, 1893.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6.
Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:
SECTION 6.
The Constitution be amended by adding Article XXV as follows, to-wit:
ARTICLE XXV.
Section 1. The necessary and proper power for the construction, maintenance, and operation of any canal, dam, or other artificial work, or for the construction of any canal, dam, or other artificial work, or for the purchase, lease, or operation of any canal, dam, or other artificial work, shall be conferred upon the Legislature, or upon any body of officers elected by it, and the same shall not be exercised until and unless the same shall have been approved by a majority of three-fourths of the Legislature.

Resolved by the House, the Senate concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon be and is hereby proposed:
SECTION 7.
The Executive Department of the State of Oregon shall have the right to suspend any county or city officer, or any other officer, until and unless the same shall have been approved by a majority of three-fourths of the Legislature.

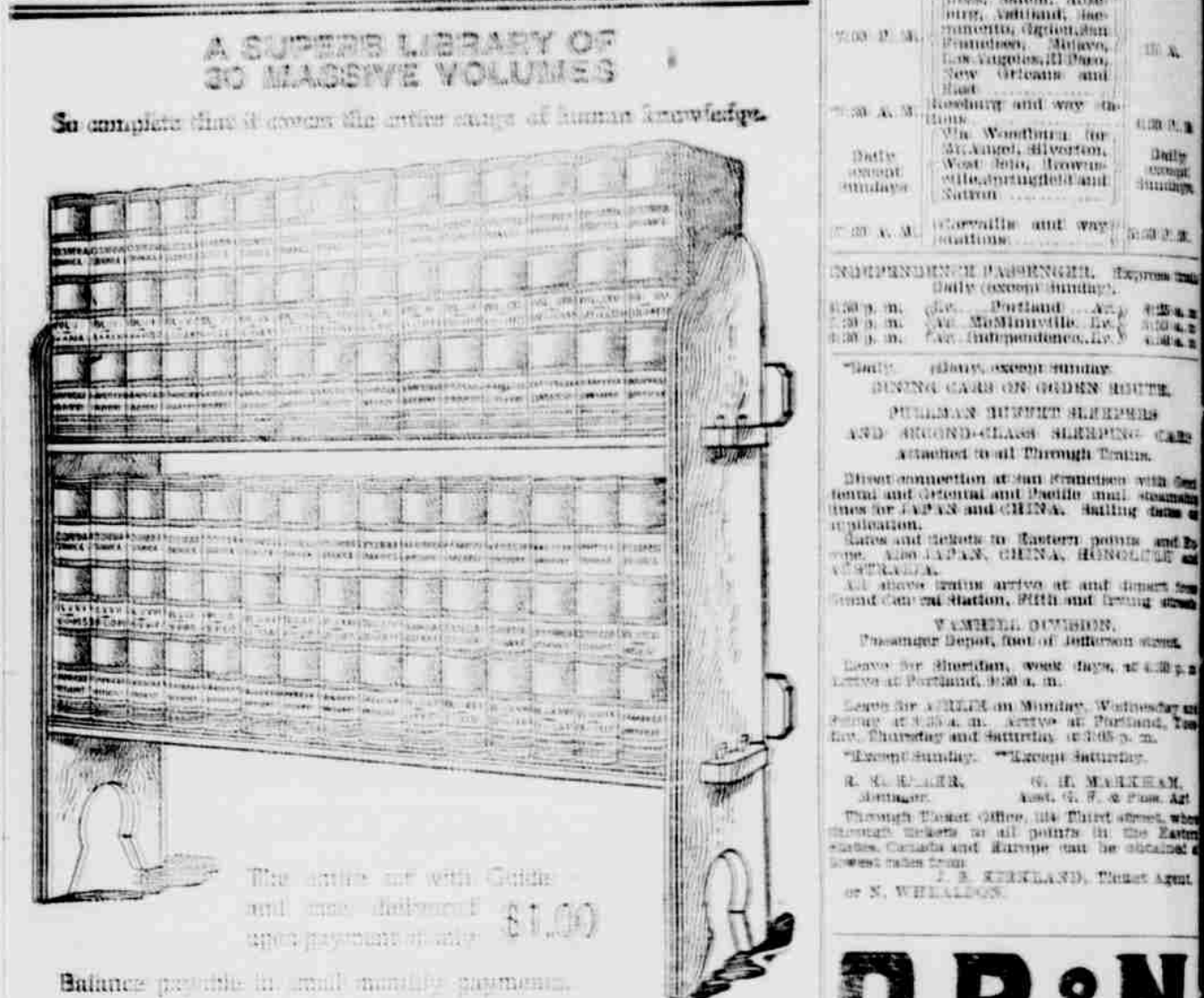
