Fruit Growers Meeting.

At a recent meeting of several prominent fruitgrowers held at Corvallis, it was decided to hold a fruitgrowers convention at the chamber of commerce building in Portland on the 7th and 8th of March. Everyone interested in the fruit industry is invited to be present. The following is the resolution that was passed:

It is the consensus of opinion of this convention that the future progress of the fruit industry of the Pacific Northwest necessitates the organization of fruitgrowers into permanent associations for the preparation and marketing of their products. Under present methods the grower is not a factor in determining the price which he shall receive for his fruit, nor what the consumer shall pay, knowing as we do that the individual competition amongst growers is responsible for this condition.

We are firmly convinced that the true remedy for this evil is co-operation in marketing.

To this end we therefore recommend that the great prune industry of the Pacific Northwest shall be organized into one general association, representing as much as seventy-five (75) per cent of the total product.

We would also recommend that local organizations be formed for the purpose of education in improving the standard of quality, for uniformity of drying, grading and packing.

We therefore earnestly recommend that a meeting of the producers of dried fruits in the Pacific Northwest be called in convention at Portland, on Wednesday and Thursday, March 7th and 8th, for the purpose of effecting such permanent organization as may be determined at that time for furthering the uniform marketing of the products of the Pacific coast, and in order that these plans be carried out, we recommend that a committee of prominent fruitgrowers be appointed, one grower from each fruit district in the Pacific Northwest, to take this matter in hand and secure an organization at that meeting.

Proposals for Refunding Water Bonds.

Dalles City Oregon.

Sealed proposals will be received by the board of water commissioners of Dalles City, Oregon, at said city until 5:30 o'clock p. m. of the 26 day of Feb., 1900, for twenty-five thousand dollars; and twenty thousand dollars of refunding water bonds of said city, as it is not settled as to whether the total amount of bonds will be \$25,000 or \$20,000; authority is extended to the said board to issue refunding water bonds in the sum of \$25,000, but if found not to be necessary, the issue will be for no more than \$20,000; and at a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent per annum payable twenty years from date of issue, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States, at any city therein, at the option of the buyer.

The bonds mentioned will be issued under the provisions of the several legislative acts of the state of Oregon, approved Feb. 26, 1885, Feb. 19, 1889, and Feb. 14, 1895, and in pursuance of an ordinance adopted by the common council of Dalles City, approved January 25, 1900. The proposed refunding water bonds are intended for the redemption of outstanding water bonds in the sum of \$25,000; but in case the board of water commissioners prefer, it will issue refunding bonds for \$20,000 only, therefore bidders may make proposals for both \$25,000 and \$20,000, and in the denomination of \$500 each.

No bid will be entertained for a rate less than par value of the bonds. Premiums and rate of interest will be taken into consideration in passing on the value of all bids.

Bidders must deposit with the president of the board a duly certified check on some responsible bank equal to 2 per cent of the amount of bonds bid for, or accompany his bid with cash of such amount as will equal such per cent of his bid, and such certified check made payable to the president of the board of water commissioners of Dalles City, Or., as liquidated damages in case the bidder shall fail or neglect to receive and pay for, at the office of the city treasurer of said city, the bonds awarded to him on his bid, on or before the first day of March, 1900.

Attention should be given the fact that the board will not issue and dispose of more than \$20,000 of such refunding bonds, unless it shall be deemed necessary to do so, but otherwise, if the board shall find that it is necessary to issue bonds in the sum of \$25,000, it will then offer and issue the full sum, (\$25,000).

The right to reject any and all bids is reserved by the said board of water commissioners.

Bids should be addressed to the president of said board, or to the city recorder, Dalles City, Wasco county, Oregon, and noted "Proposals for refunding water bonds."
