BUSINESS LOCALS

Superintendent S. M. Ormsby, of the forest reserve, has received from the general office instructions regarding the grazing of stock within the Cascade reserve. As the department determined the grazing question for the reserve in Washington some time ago, Superintendent Ormsby has been anxiously awaiting instructions regarding the Oregon reserve. The letter received by him Monday is as follows:

"Under department regulations approved April 4, 1900, the secretary of the interior has authorized the pasturing of 200,000 head of sheep within the Cascade range reserve, south of White river; the sheep to enter the reserve not earlier than June 15th. Cattle and horses may also graze in the reserve as heretofore, except that applications will be required.

"All applicants for the privilege of grazing sheep or other live stock in the reserve shall agree, in their applications, that they will hereafter pay, on demand, such reasonable price per head as the secretary of the interior may hereafter require; and for failure to make such payment, when called upon to do so, the permit will be revoked and the animals removed from the reserve.

"Permits, when issued, will cover a specified grazing period; so that the period must be stated in the application. The sheep-grazing forms, with such changes as are necessary to cover cattle or horse-grazing conditions, may be used for cattle and horses."
