WAR LOSSES VERY SMALL

Since Beginning of Philippine Campaign, American Army's Total Losses Are Only 2256 Men—Losses at Santiago Were 1688.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—In comparison with the casualties suffered by the British troops in South Africa, those sustained by the American forces in the Philippines seem very small. A statement just compiled by the war department shows that from July 1, 1898, when American troops reached Manila, until April 27, 1900, these deaths have occurred:

Killed and died of wounds, 43 officers, 532 men; died of disease, 26 officers, 1635 men; total, 69 officers, 2187 men. Grand total, 2256. Several thousand men have been wounded, but only a small percentage have died of wounds, and most of them have returned to duty.

The war department has just issued a complete table of the casualties in the Fifth Army Corps, in the operations against Santiago, from June 22 until July 17, 1898. The losses are given:

Killed, 21 officers and 222 enlisted men; wounded, 101 officers, 1344 enlisted men; total, 1688 officers and enlisted men. The total strength of the forces operating against Santiago is given as 869 officers and 17,349 men. The Seventh Regular Infantry lost the greatest number of men, its killed and wounded numbering 132. The Sixteenth Regular Infantry lost 129 men, and Governor Roosevelt's regiment and the Sixth Regular Infantry each lost 127 men.

Bolt of Pingree.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The announcement of Governor Pingree in favor of Democracy is believed by Republicans from that state to mean that he is making a distinct bid for either the vice-presidential nomination on the Democratic ticket or for the nomination of that party as governor, it being evident that he cannot be elected either to the senate or as governor by the Republicans again. The Michigan senators declare that the bolt of Pingree will not place Michigan in the doubtful column, and that McKinley will carry it by not less than 30,000. Pingree has a personal following in Michigan that has been surprising, and if he could hold that personal following as the nominee of the Democrats, he might possibly make Michigan somewhat unsafe. Michigan was very unsound on the financial question, and its delegates to the St. Louis convention fought the gold plank as hard as they could, but there has been a great deal of education since then, and possibly the Populistic and Bryanistic ideas are not as strong as when the Republicans went into the campaign on a gold platform four years ago. The Democrats are looking upon Michigan, Minnesota and Indiana as doubtful ground, and these they claim as sure Democratic, will give them the necessary votes to elect Bryan.

EUGENE, April 30.—The steam saw mill of the Eugene Lumber Company caught fire shortly before 1 o'clock and will be a total loss. The lumber in the yard is burning, and probably none of it can be saved. It requires the best work of the fire department can do to save the houses in the vicinity. They can only get water with one hose, and are almost helpless in their efforts to check the

flames, which are spreading by the aid of a good breeze.

A wagon bridge across the Willamette has now caught fire and will probably be a total loss.

Four years ago they decided against fusion, but when the campaign began to warm up their candidate for governor, O. D. Jones, of Edina, withdrew, and the name of Lon V. Stephens was placed at the head of the state ticket.

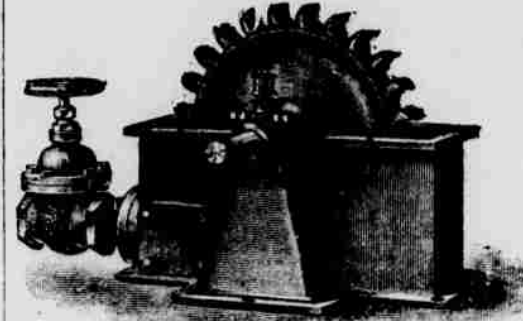
