Waukakas, one of the hest known and familiar of Klickitat's Indian people, died on Sunday last at his bome at the Waukakas springs, on the Big Klickitat river. He was over 100 years old and had taken an active pary in most of the stirring events connected with the earliest history of the Northwest. His remains were intered near the river where he had resided since 1830.

Dr. R. E. Stewart was quite intimate with the aged Indian, who had on various occasions related many interesting episodes of his long life to the doctor -all in the abropt manner peculiar to the Indian. 


