CELEBRATED INDIAN DEAD.

He Was Over 100 Years Old and Had Known Sheridan.

Waukikas, one of the best known and familiar of Klickitat's Indian people, died on Sunday last at his home at the Waukikas springs, on the Big Klickitat river. He was over 100 years old and had taken an active part in most of the stirring events connected with the earliest history of the Northwest. His remains were interred near the river where he had resided since 1830.

Dr. R. E. Stewart was quite intimate with the aged Indian, who had on various occasions related many interesting episodes of his long life to the doctor—all in the abrupt manner peculiar to the Indian. He claimed to have seen the first vessel come up the Columbia river, a large three or four masted ship; to have seen the first white man; the first fire arms, and the first fire water. He was sure of the latter! To those with whom years of acquaintance had brought him into close friendship, he was talkative; but to the stranger rather silent and reserved.

He was acquainted with Sheridan at the time he was stationed at the Cascades and undoubtedly participated in many of those battles with the whites, which were quite numerous, along the river from that place up to and beyond The Dalles. Indeed, he admitted to the doctor that in the battles and forays of '57 in this and the neighboring county of Yakima, he had taken a conspicuous and active part.

For years, the number of which no white man now living in this section can tell, Waukikas has lived where he passed away. To the doctor he insisted he had come there in 1830. He had no family, all having died or else departed for other parts, except two grand children who resided with and took care of him. On his place was a famous mineral or soda spring, said by those familiar with the water to be the best along the river. Several parties have endeavored to obtain possession of it for commercial purposes but were never successful. Their opportunity may now come in the early future.

So, by the side of the turbulent Klickitat whose waters had murmured music in his ears for seventy years; by the rocks over which his footsteps had trod
