### Famine in Central India.

LONDON, May 17.—Dealing with the famine in the central provinces of India, which have an area equal to that of Austria and a population of nearly 11,000,000 and which were formerly most prosperous, the Daily Chronicle correspondent at Bilaspur writes:  
"The demand for government assistance is unparalleled. In one district 40 per cent are dependent on the Sirdar for their daily bread; in two others the percentage is over 30. In the whole area there are 1,500,000 people with no other sources of subsistence than government charity.  
"In the eastern division, where the crop failure was the most complete, we have had the best opportunity for grappling with the famine. The abandonment of desolation is here. Not a toiler is seen in the fields. When the last rain failed and the rule peasantry saw the young rice shoots blasted by the fierce August sun, they were left without resources, and the few silver ornaments which every Indian family possess went at last. Then they crowded the relief works by thousands of thousands."

### Strike Threatened in Metal Trades.

NEW YORK, May 17.—It is feared that the arbitration committees of the National Metal Trades Association and of the International Association of Machinists, who have been in session for nearly a week, are hopelessly deadlocked. Much depends upon reaching an amicable adjustment, especially to manufacturers and machinists in the West. Unless matters are adjusted the country will witness one of the most serious disputes between capital and labor that has been seen in years. No member of either committee would give any information relative to the points in dispute. Unless a settlement is reached, not only will strikes which were temporarily declared off pending arbitration be renewed, but the troubles will spread.

### Columbia Southern Warehouse.

At Shaniko the Columbia Southern Railway Co. controls 80x100 feet of the Shaniko warehouse building, to be used as a freight warehouse, through which they will receive and forward freight in the usual manner. The impression that all business must be done through forwarding houses is an erroneous one and we take this means of dispelling it. Freight received and held twenty-four hours will be turned over to a forwarding house subject to the order of the consignee. The rate on wool in sacks or in bales from Shaniko to The Dalles is 25 cents per 100 pounds.

### Report from Pretoria.

PRETORIA, Tuesday, May 15.—An official bulletin announces that the federal troops stormed and occupied the forts around Mafeking on Saturday morning. The same night the federals were surrounded, losing, so far as known, seven killed, seventeen wounded and a number taken prisoners. The British casualties are said to have been fifty killed or wounded.

It is reported that the advance guard of the force proceeding to the relief of Mafeking from the south was repulsed yesterday.
