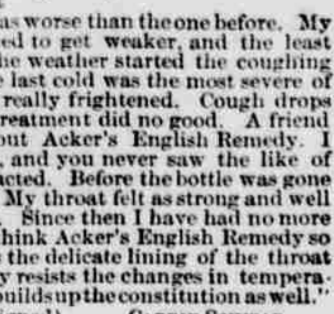

#### "GLENCOE MODDER."

The Soul Harrowing Name That Has Been Bestowed on an **Stucky English Infant.**

One of the effects of the present war in South Africa is to be found in the registers of births in the several districts of England, some very peculiar names, arising out of the Transvaal campaign, having been bestowed by patriotic but inconsiderate parents on their children. In a populous town in Lancashire, for instance, there is a little boy rejoicing in the uncommon name of "Mafeking," given him in honor of his uncle, who formed one of the garrison of that town under Col. Baden-Powell, while in one or two instances the name "Volunteer" has been given to children as evidence of the intense interest which has been taken in the departure of the "citizen soldiers" to the front.

The names of several of the leading engagements which have up to the present been fought figure prominently in these registers, such as "Glencoe," a very popular name for a boy just now; "Dundee," "Eland" (the full name of "Elandslangte" having apparently proved too much of a mouthful), and "Belmont," the last a favorite name for girls, while one boy living near London will have cause in a few years' time to bemoan the hard fate which saddled him with the name of "Glencoe Modder." With what must be looked upon as a daring anticipation of events, a girl in North London has just been registered as "Roberta Pretoria." Speaking of Pretoria reminds one that several children already bear that name, though so far no one has had the courage to name his offspring "Bloemfontein;" "Kimberley," however, has been utilized several times.

#### MAKERS OF WILLS.

Find It Very Troublesome to Draw Up the Papers in Bavaria and Prussia.

Bavaria seems to have placed the most effective pitfalls and barbed wire entanglements in the path of the guileless maker of wills. In that country it is imperative that the most simple will must be attested with all solemnity by seven separate witnesses, who must be present at the same time; and their action must be sanctioned and their signatures must be authenticated by a public notary. Prussia has also its special complications, under the code of Frederick II. That monarch, distrusting "ignorant notaries, or ministers, or casual persons but little learned in matters of law," decided that only wills made in solemn form before justices or judges should be valid. To these experts all particulars must be told, any questions they choose to put must be answered, and they finally draw up the document, read it to the testator and append their signatures. If it is preferred the will may be drawn before hand and submitted to the judges, who, after due inquiries to satisfy themselves that all is right, will sanction and confirm it.

#### THE HOME WEDDING.

What to Do When the Nuptial Ceremony is Celebrated at Home.

For the home wedding the house is made bright with flowers. The mother and sisters of the bride receive the guests. The father first appears when he enters the room with his daughter. As the hour strikes the clergyman takes his place, facing the company, followed by the bridegroom and his best man, who stand at his left, awaiting the bride. Two ushers mark off an aisle with broad white ribbons, attaching them at the ends, and they precede the rest of the bridal party, who enter at the farthest corner of the room. The bridesmaid or maids follow the ushers, and the bride comes last with her father. Or, the ushers may precede the best man and the one bridesmaid, and the bride and bridegroom follow. At a house wedding they often have no attendants and rarely any music. At the conclusion of the service the clergyman congratulates the bride and bridegroom and then retires. They then turn to be greeted, first by their parents, next by the members of the two families and near relatives, afterwards by every one present. All wish them happiness. Refreshments are served in the dining-room, and may be simple or elaborate, as one chooses.—Ladies' Home Journal.
