ENORMOUS INCREASE IN EXPORTS

Almost \$40,000,000 in April—Have Increased 150 Per Cent in Ten Years.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(Special to the Evening Telegram.)—An exportation of \$40,000,000 worth of manufactures in thirty days is a record unparalleled for American manufactures. That is the record for the month of April, 1900. The details of the April exportations—just completed by the Treasury Bureau of Statistics—show that the exportation of manufactures during that month were by far the greatest of any month in our history and within a fraction of \$40,000,000. This gives assurance that the exports of the fiscal year, which ends with June, will considerably exceed \$400,000,000 and be nearly three times as much as a decade ago.

This phenomenal increase in exportation of manufactures is especially striking when compared with the progress made by European nations, our rivals in the attempt to supply the world's market with manufactured goods. Great Britain's exports of manufactures show a slight increase since 1890, and an examination of the export record of the principal European countries fails to disclose an instance in which the increase has been as much as 25 per cent, while that of the United States, meanwhile, has been more than 150 per cent.

Bryan New Sure of Nomination.

NEW YORK, May 31.—The Herald says: William J. Bryan will be practically nominated for president when the democratic convention of this state meets in its city next Tuesday. There will be no opposition worth the name to overcome all precedents of the organization and placing the national delegates who are to be chosen under instructions to support the Nebraska candidate in Kansas City. All plans for opposing Bryan in the national convention were ended upon the hostility of the New York delegation and with this removed, the convention will be assured to him in advance.

Conferences held by the opponents of the plan to instruct the delegates showed that a majority of the state convention are against them, and they gave up with the Tammany vote and the delegates from the interior of the state who have been instructed for Bryan, his name claimed 275 of the 425 delegates in favor of instructions.

Death Rate of Civil War Veterans.

NEW YORK, May 31.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Veterans of the civil war are dying off at the rate of about 3 1/2 per cent per annum. Commissioner Evans estimates that there are about 925,000 survivors of the civil war. Of this number there were on the pension rolls last year 742,467. During the year 24,787 pensioned veterans died. Assuming that the death rate among those not pensioned is the same as among the pensioners, the total number of veterans who died during the year would be about 30,855.

Commissioner Evans estimates that the average age of the veterans who still survive is about 59 years. The last survivor of the war of 1812 died last summer, 75 years after the close of that war. At the same rate, there will probably be a few survivors of the civil war still living in 1940.

Ex-Queen Lili Will Sue Uncle Sam.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—The Call states that ex-Queen Liliuokalani has decided to bring suit against the United States government for the restoration of the crown lands and revenues. Colonel McFarlane, her confidential adviser, said in reference to the matter:

"I have advised the queen to consult Mr. Joseph O. Carter, her private agent, before bringing suit. A syndicate was formed last winter, which offered to employ the best attorneys in the United States to press her claims, and briefs and other papers for her case have been prepared.

"There is nothing to prevent her asserting her claim to the crown lands to whoever she may please, and the cause may be tried in foreign courts, but in any event, it is likely that action will be brought before the next session of congress."

Cheered O'er His Grave.

NEW YORK, May 31.—The Memorial day service at the grave of Father McGlynn was marked by bitter denunciations of those in the Catholic church who had disciplined the priest for his theories as to the economic question. At least 3000 persons were in the vicinity of the grave, and as the Rev. Dr. Burtzell and others declared that Dr. McGlynn had been a martyr to the principles he advocated, the people forgot the solemnity of the occasion and cheered.

The grave and the monument at the head were both completely covered with flowers. When the crowd had left, a detail from the veteran corps of the Sixty-ninth regiment gathered at the grave and paid soldiers' honors to the dead priest.

Pacification of Philippines.

NEW YORK, May 31.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Another effort in the direction of the establishment of civil government in the Philip-

ippines will be inaugurated tomorrow, when the Taft Philippine commission arrives in Manila. As soon after its arrival as possible, the commission will issue a proclamation embodying instructions under which it will act. It will inform the Filipinos that it has been appointed to establish civil government through the islands and will urge their co-operation.

It will co-operate with the military service until September 1, by which time it is expected the municipal and provincial governments will be in operation. The commission will then separate, Judge Taft remaining in Manila, and the four members being distributed among the four departments and acting independently in the capacity of governors. The authorities have also established a system of espionage in China, designed to apprise General MacArthur and Rear-Admiral Remy of filibustering expedition.

"While scouting near San Miguel Mayumo (Luzon) May 29, Captain Chas. D. Roberts, Privates McIntyre and Akens were captured; Sergeant Gallen, privates McCourt and Green killed; George Kiner wounded in the thigh, all of company I, 35th regiment."

It Was Plague.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—Dr. Kellogg, who has been investigating the corpse of a Chinaman found in a Chinese undertaking establishment, expressed an opinion late last night that the Chinaman had died of the plague.

"I am satisfied it is the plague," he said, "and I am confident that an autopsy and animal inoculation will confirm it. One not conversant with the situation in Chinatown cannot imagine the difficulties that confront the inspectors, but they can be imagined when I say we have only discovered the cases after the victims were dead."
