PORTO RICANS ON THE UNITED STATES FINANCES.

The following article is from the "Correspondencia de Puerto Rico" of April 26, 1900. It is interesting in that it shows how our new wards sum up the political differences between our two great parties on the money question:

"The fiscal campaign of the democrats, or better said, of Mr. Bryan, for an enlarged metallic circulation, has passed to the category of settled questions. It is a dead letter, in view of the statistics that have just been published. There is now circulated in the United States more gold, more silver and more paper money than in any epoch in the history of the union. For the first time the per capita wealth has reached \$26.12, and for the first time in the history of the country there is in circulation the sum of \$2,000,000,000.

"During the last five years the sum of money in circulation on the first day of April has been as follows:

April 1, 1896.....	\$1,528,629,463
April 1, 1897.....	1,689,000,645
April 1, 1898.....	1,756,058,645
April 1, 1899.....	1,927,846,942
April 1, 1900.....	2,021,274,504

"This demonstrates that during the four years that the administration has been in the hands of Mr. McKinley the circulating medium of the United States has increased \$492,645,043, which is 23 per cent.

"The increase of the circulation of gold has also been enormous. On April 1, 1900, there were \$785,845,549 in gold coin and gold certificates, while in 1896 at the beginning of the McKinley administration this same circulation was only \$489,151,505, making an increase of 60 per cent in the four years.

"The language of figures is most eloquent, and there is no remedy except to bow to the force of their arguments."

THE CHRONICLE has been very reluctant to say anything, one way or the other, on the sewer question, which will enter into the city election next Monday; but it is notorious that if the proposed system is carried through it will work practical confiscation to a large number of property owners. THE CHRONICLE has felt all the time of the sewer controversy that the council should have respected a remonstrance which was signed by taxpayers representing, anyhow, three-fourths of all the property involved. That a sewer system is needed is not denied. That it should be inaugurated, and inaugurated as speedily as possible, is conceded. But ninety-five per cent of the men who have to foot the bills believe that a sewer system fully as efficient, or more efficient than that proposed by the council, can be built at a price that will work no great hardship on anybody. No council can afford to treat such consensus of opinion as was expressed in the remonstrance with disrespect. The question next Monday will not be "sewer or no sewer?" but a sewer system at a cost that would bankrupt a large number of poor people, or one that will be reasonably within their means.

The Hillsboro Independent says that the Oregonian makes a mistake when it charges the defeat of the republican legislative ticket to the McBride influence. The defeat is rather due to the men, who, heretofore, have acted with the Corbett-Simon management, and are now utterly disgusted with their methods. Those are the men who did the work, for if they had voted as they did two years ago, republican candidates would have been elected as they were in 1898. To further prove that McBride did not do it, note the vote of Columbia county, McBride's home. Had Senator McBride or his friends refused support to the ticket,

Cornelius, for joint senator, would have been beaten. Yet McBride's own county is the only place in the district where Cornelius got a majority. The Oregonian should revise its style of criticism.

A recent letter from Manila says: "The speech of Senator Beveridge has been translated and a copy placed in the hands of every native. This speech is thought to be responsible for much of the unrest and turbulence now so prevalent—the natives are convinced, after reading the speech, that it is the intention to keep them in subjection for commercial exploitation."

Tony Noltner's head is level when he says in the Dispatch: "The managers of the national committee should shut down on Cyclone Davis' biennial excursions to Oregon. They are expensive to the party and of no value. In fact Oregon has orators to spare and is not in need of any imports."

Ex-Secretary of State Kincaid has been elected county judge of Lane county by one majority. If Kincaid had a bit of spunk in him he would feel insulted by a vote like that and resign; but he won't.

Columbia Southern Warehouse.

At Shaniko the Columbia Southern Railway Co. controls 80x100 feet of the Shaniko warehouse building, to be used as a freight warehouse, through which they will receive and forward freight in the usual manner. The impression that all business must be done through forwarding houses is an erroneous one and we take this means of dispelling it. Freight received and held twenty-four hours will be turned over to a forwarding house subject to the order of the consignee. The rate on wool in sacks or in bales from Shaniko to The Dalles is 25 cents per 100 pounds.
