### THESE FOR INSTANCE.

The Philadelphia platform is a flat, rapid, plattitudinous and slovenly stump speeches. Just one thing the republican party has done for which credit is due it. It has established the gold standard. These are the plutocrats the free-trade newspapers are after who are continually condemning the policy of protection. These are the great trusts and millionaires who are enabled to keep their heels on the necks of the common people by the aid of the protective tariff.

There is not a man in Oregon in any calling who should not be interested in the further prosperity and enrichment of these trusts and millionaires or the farms of Oregon. And the men in this state who do not recognize the value of protection for them are very few and far between.—Statesman.
