

NEW CITY COUNCIL MEETS
And to Authorize the Mayor to issue Bonds
of Recession and Revenue.

At the first meeting of the new city council, last evening the following were present: Councilman S. G. Ferguson, Josephine Wilson, Superintendent, Esther Wilson, Superintendent, Mrs. Lene and Dennis, and the new mayor, Hon. E. S. Danner, president. So far as we learned no special question was given the new members, but what will follow in the future for these new chads will be sufficient without any particularities. For surely the life of a municipality is not to be governed.

The mayor's first act was to announce the treasurer's bond, after which his message, which is addressed elsewhere, was read.

A communication from Fire Engineer George Brown, announcing that the city purchased a fire engine last night, was read and approved, and the national ensign will soon float over the engine house.

There was presented an abstract of time and cost from Mayes & Huntington covering the property on which the post office is located. \$125 were all in all. The city has contemplated purchasing the ground, and the matter was referred to the judiciary committee. If the bill is approved by them the purchase will be made at \$125.

Councilman Wilson introduced a resolution that whereas from the report of the gross income of The Dalles postoffice it is evident we are entitled to free delivery, the mayor and council be authorized to make application to the postal department for the same. The resolution was adopted.

The applications of James McNamee, James Hannon, James Like, Charles Jones and G. A. Phairan for appointment as night watchmen were read, and upon voting James Like received five votes, or a majority of the council. He is therefore nightwatchman for the ensuing year.

Mayor Danner then placed before the council the names of John Michel for recorder and C. V. Chamberlain for marshal, and on vote for confirmation by the council, two votes were cast in favor of each and seven against.

The council then adjourned and will probably be called in special session before the next regular meeting.
