## IMPERIAL TROOPS DEFEND THEM

Sheng, Director of Chinese Imperial Telegraphs, Has So Reported to Minister Wu at Washington, Adding That Foreign Ministers Are All Safe.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The following telegram was received last night by Minister Wu from Heng, Director-General of the Imperial Telegraphs at Shanghai, dated yesterday:

July 5.—Two Legations in Peking still preserved. All Ministers safe. Rebellious troops and rioters make attacks but suffer many losses. Imperial troops are protecting, but meet with much difficulty in doing so. It is feared that food and ammunition are exhausted.

LONDON, July 9.—Admiral Bruce has sent a telegram to the Admiralty Department from Taku, under date of July 7, to the effect that there are grounds for hoping that Prince Ching, with his army is at Peking protecting the Legations against Prince Tuan, his army and the Boxers.

BRUSSELS, July 9.—A dispatch from Shanghai received here says a Chinese newspaper asserts that Prince Ching's troops have arrived at Peking to revictual the Europeans and defend them against the rebels.

YOKOHAMA, July 9.—The government has decided to immediately dispatch 23,000 men and 5000 horses to China.

The newspapers, in endorsing this action, point out that should the foreigners at Peking perish, Japan could not be absolved from blame.

BERLIN, July 9.—The German Consul at Che Foo cables under today's date that the American mission at Tung Lu and the Catholic mission at Ching Chu Fu have been looted. He adds that the Boxers continue their endeavors to incite the population of Che Foo to revolt. Li Ping Hong, the former Governor of Shantung, with 8000 men, has gone northward from Nankin, as the Governor of that place requested him to withdraw.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Though fearful of giving false encouragement, the State Department officials are bound to admit today that there is reason for hope now respecting the welfare of the legations at Peking. Minister Wu's cablegram from Sheng, taken in connection with the report of Admiral Bruce from Tien Tsin, has done much to encourage this hopeful feeling.

Mr. Wu brought his cablegram to the State Department this morning, and pointed out to Secretary Hay what he regarded as some significant and gratifying features of his dispatch. Such, for instance, was Sheng's description of the Chinese who are attacking the Legations as "rebellious troops and rioters,"

and the positive statement that the Chinese Government is opposing them.

NEW YORK, July 9.—To the continuation of the hot weather is attributed the high death rate among children. For the first six days of July the deaths reported of children of five years old or under averaged fifty-three in Manhattan and the Bronx, and forty-one in Brooklyn. Saturday's report showed fifty-one deaths of children under five years in Manhattan and the Bronx, and fifty-eight in Brooklyn. Sunday's list includes forty-five such deaths in Manhattan and the Bronx.

### Oregon to Remain in Dock.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The Navy Department was informed today that the Oregon has arrived at Che Foo. She will start for Kobe, Japan, to dock, July 10 or 12. The cablegram is from Captain Rodgers, of the Nashville, who made a flying trip from his station at Che Foo out to the scene of the grounding of the Oregon, 35 miles northwest of the port. His dispatch reads as follows: "Che Foo, July 9.—Oregon starts for Kobe dock, Japan, about 10th or 12th, stopping en route, if weather is bad. All well on board Oregon. "Rodgers" The dispatch conveys indirectly the information that wire communication with Che Foo is open again.

A rough estimate made at the Navy Department consigns the Oregon to the dry dock about three months. The courtesy exhibited by the Japanese Government in allowing the Oregon to use the dock, which is owned by the government, is much appreciated by the Navy Department officials here.

### Decided on Fusion.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 9.—Plans for the democratic national campaign of 1900 were outlined and practically agreed upon today at a protected conference between the leaders of the party. The plan includes the appointment of a campaign committee, as agreed upon between the representatives of the Democratic Silver Republican, and Populist parties at Kansas City. This committee will include members of all three parties, and perhaps also democrats not members of the national committee, but who are prominent in the councils of the party. This committee will, it is said, have charge in a measure of the practical working of the campaign, and will work for fusion on state and congressional tickets where ever possible.

The press and executive committee, it is expected, will, with one or two exceptions, be the same as last year. The personnel of all the committees was left in the hands of Chairman Jones. The question of national headquarters was also left in his hands. It was stated that Chicago would probably be selected.

### WONDERFUL CAPE NOME.

Capt. Craigie Corroborates the Stories of the Rich Gold Diggings.

In a letter received recently, Lieut. Wallace M. Craigie, Seventh United States Infantry, now stationed at Cape Nome, Alaska, in charge of an army substation, says:

"Cape Nome, according to the old-timers, will be the greatest mining camp in the world. Nome City, as it is now called, is right on the coast of Behring sea, and extends for some miles along the shore. Along the beach the miners rock out gold and make from \$5 to \$50 or more a day—one man. This sounds like a statement that admits of doubt, but it is a fact. One man told me himself he had worked with three others for 14 days, and they had rocked out just \$6,000, all hard-earned gold, but they had it to prove the statement. Then up along the several creeks—Anvil, Discovery, Snow Gulch etc.—the yield is really enormous. The famous claim here is known as No. 1 on Discovery, and has turned out about \$1,900,000. A few days ago a nugget weighing 30 ounces was found, and about a month ago one weighing a little over 19 ounces was taken from the sluice boxes on the same claim. Some men have a centrifugal pump down on the beach below the town, and have sluice boxes running back to the soil called tundra by the natives, which is filled with fine gold of a very pure quality.

The thing that impressed me most was that in less than a month after the town started the 'diggings' was the circulating medium, and valued at \$10 an ounce, although no official assay had been made. Men go out with their rockers and pans, and come back to town, eat and drink, and pay for it with the result of the day's diggings. There are numerous propositions to interest men of capital, such as a good water supply system, electric light plants, and the man who can lay a trolley system up to the mines for transporting freight and supplies has the greatest and surest business venture of all. These are now carried by pack trains and freight wagons. Dogs are also used, they being able to carry about 40 pounds each. The town has increased in five months from about 250 to 3,500 inhabitants, and it is thought when navigation opens in the spring there will be 30,000 or 40,000 people here. Coal is \$75 a ton, lumber \$12 per 1,000; yet people are building and settling here. Our new quarters are very comfortable—frame covered with corrugated iron. We are all nicely settled for the winter. I am told the northern lights as seen here are beyond description, and the moon as bright and clear as crystal, which in a measure will have to make up for no day or sun if our monthly mail scheme only proves successful there are many worse places than Cape Nome, even though so isolated and distant. We hope for great things in the spring; more United States troops and better facilities for communication with the outside world during the long fall and winter season."
