GEMS FROM M'KINLEY'S LETTER.

For labor a short day is better than a short dollar.

They (the trusts) are dangerous conspiracies against the public good and should be made the subject of prohibitory or penal legislation.

They (the inhabitants of Porto Rico) have a much larger measure of self government than the inhabitants of Louisiana under Jefferson.

Every effort has been directed to their (the natives of the Philippines) peace and prosperity, their advancement and well being, not for aggrandizement, not for pride of might, not for trade or commerce, not for exploitation, but for humanity and civilization and for the protection of the vast majority of the population, who welcome our sovereignty against the designing minority whose first demand, after the surrender of Manila by the Spanish arms, was to enter the city that they might loot it and destroy those not in sympathy with their selfish and treacherous designs.

Nobody who will avail himself of the facts (which are given) will longer hold that there was any alliance between our soldiers and the insurgents, or that any promise of independence was made to them.

It is our purpose to establish in the Philippines a government suitable to the wants and conditions of the inhabitants and to prepare them for self government and to give them self government when they are ready for it.

The American people will not make the murders of our soldiers the agents of the republic.

As a protectorate power we could not initiate action, but would be compelled to follow and uphold a people with no capacity yet to go alone.

If we cannot establish any government of our own without the consent of the governed * * * then we could not establish a stable government or make ours a protectorate without like consent.

Imperialism has no place in its creed or conduct. Freedom is the rock upon which the republican party was builded and now rests.

Empire has been expelled from the Philippines by American freedom.

The republican party does not have to assert its devotion to the Declaration of Independence.

If our opponents would only practice as well as preach the doctrines of Abraham Lincoln there would be no fear for the safety of our institutions at home or the rightful in any territory over which our flag floats.

Nations which go to war must be prepared to accept its resultant obligation, and when they make treaties must keep them.

The American verdict will be for duty and against desertion.

GALVESTON AND POMPEII.

For centuries history and romance have dwelt upon the destruction of Pompeii as one of the world's most stupendous tragedies. But that calamity has been exceeded in the Galveston catastrophe in the opinion of the Spokesman-Review. The population of Pompeii at the time of its destruction has been estimated all the way from 12,000 to 50,000, with the weight of authority inclining toward the smaller estimate. In all probability the city was less than half as large as Galveston, and since all reports agree that half the property values of the Texas city have been obliterated, the material loss there will equal to the material loss

of the ancient city, and may exceed it, since the United States quartermaster there fears that the city has been "destroyed beyond its ability to recover." This will certainly be the case if later investigation shall show that the deep-water channels into the harbor have been filled with sand, as the government would have ventured another appropriation of \$6,000,000.

In point of loss of life the Galveston disaster surpasses the Pompeian tragedy, even if the lower estimates be accepted. The fatal shower of volcanic ashes, sand, pebbles, and scoriae was not so suddenly overwhelming at Pompeii as to preclude flight, and nearly all except the sick, prisoners, sentinels and a few who returned to secure some treasures saved their lives in that way.
