New York, Sept. 17 .- A dispatch to the Times from Paris says: An imporportant functionary of the German foreign office now in Paris says that it will soon be generally recognized that Germany, Great Britain and Japan are in accord as to the policy to be followed in Caina, and that opposition to their plans comes principally from Russia, with whom of course is France.






