


"The Circus Girl."

LOURENCO MARQUES, Sept. 18.—Fighting is proceeding at Komatiporto. All the available men have been sent to the frontier. It is expected that the Komatiporto bridge will be destroyed. There is great uneasiness here.

Komatiporto is a town on the frontier of the Transvaal, and the railroad leading from Pretoria to Portuguese territory. It is situated about fifty miles from Lourenco Marques. With the occupation of Komatiporto, the British would be able to cut off all supplies reaching the Boers by rail road from Portuguese territory.
