

Serious Threats.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Sept. 24.—There was great excitement here last night and strikers made assertions that may lead to trouble today, when attempts are made to open the mines in the Schuylkill region. Boats were made that any miners who should go to work this morning would not return to their homes alive.

The aim of the Reading company officials is to break the force of the strike in the anthracite coal region by getting a fair supply to market. The trouble as it now stands has cut off 85 per cent of the product of all the mines. The Reading company's allotment is 21 per cent, and this can be filled with the collieries only on part time. With the aid of the military it is intended to push work at every mine if possible, but this can hardly be accomplished.

At the beginning of the trouble the officials assumed that because their men had few grievances, except in the matter of wages, they could continue to operate their mines. The action of the rioters here and a change of sentiment among some of the miners have proved to cast doubt on this point, but it is well known that many of the miners in the Schuylkill region want to continue at work. A majority who do not belong to union may be kept from going to their employment today by the dread of assault.

HAZLETON, Pa., Sept. 24.—Battalion F, Eighth regiment, arrived at McAdoo, the nearest point in Skunkill county to Hazleton, early this morning. Lieutenant-Colonel Hutchinson, in command, said he was ordered to make a demonstration by marching his men through McAdoo and the surrounding towns. Each man carried twenty rounds of ammunition. Troops were received by inhabitants with evidences of enmity. Many jeered them. One woman, after the troops had passed, shouted to a group of men: "If you don't shoot some of those fellows you are no good."

Edward G. McGeehan, the Burgess of the town, declared the action of General Goblin in sending soldiers there was an outrage as the town was peaceable.

"I shall not be responsible for any overt act committed in this town while the troops are here," he said.

The entire Hazleton region was extremely quiet this morning.

Today was expected to witness either a big break among the strikers or the going out of a large additional number of workers, but neither happened.

DRINK ONLY VODKI.

The Sales of the Liquor in Russia Are Controlled by the Government.

The Russian peasant classes drink only vodka, which is distilled from rye and is sold at the average price of \$1.40 a gallon, whether in quantities of one or 10,000 gallons, says the New York Press. The government requires that the proof of vodka and brandy shall be 40 degrees and that of spirits or wine from 40 degrees to 95 degrees.

In provinces where the sale of liquor is controlled by the government, temperance societies, supported in part by the government, have been organized, with Prince Oldenburg, a distinguished philanthropist of St. Petersburg, as president. They have opened reading rooms, with libraries and restaurants, near public gardens and squares, where large numbers of working people congregate, and they sell cheap and good food with such temperance drinks as tea, milk and kvass, made from cranberries and black bread.

One of these societies has constructed two "floating restaurants," one of which will seat 600 people and the other 300. These boats are towed to points on the Neva where workingmen are employed or congregated. An open theater has been established on Petrovsky Island, where a good class of plays is given at a nominal price. Some of the public parks are also supplied with apparatus to encourage open-air sports.
