THE SITUATION IS VERY SERIOUS

Boxer Leaders in Control of the Chinese Government, and Heretofore Pro-Foreign Viceroy's Make Haste to Get in Line with the Government.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—A dispatch to the Herald from Shanghai says: The situation in China is now more serious than ever before for those who are interested in preserving the integrity of the empire. The Chinese government is in the power of Boxer leaders who are not likely to submit to the Empress Dowager any proposition unfavorable to them. The friendly viceroys of the south are still loyal to the throne and any foreign aggression in Southern China will precipitate an armed uprising.

Already the governor of Nganhwei province has addressed a memorial to the Empress Dowager, declaring that his signature to the viceroy's agreement with the foreign consuls in Shanghai was forged.

There is danger that the friendly viceroys will be replaced. Sheng, the friendly Taotai of Shanghai, has been ordered north, and that practically means his death.

Russia is holding all the forts and strategic points from Taku to Peking. Russia's possession of the Railway shows by the permanent arrangement which her officers are making that she intends to swallow the north of China. No one here believes that Russia will ever move out except under overwhelming pressure from the other powers.

Germany's assurance that she does not desire territory in China, if the latter be able to pay an indemnity, is misleading. Her demand for the punishment of the leaders of the Boxers as a condition precedent to peace negotiations means continued war and perhaps the complete disruption of the Chinese government.

Friendly feeling between Russia and Japan is increasing. France is hand in glove with Russia.

Vice-Admiral Seymour's attempt to undertake the isolated British occupation of Shanghai and to patrol the Yangtze River has weakened the British position, while losing a definite agreement for non-partition of the empire with Japan.

The United States is consistent but powerless.

Lu Li Chuan Liu, who, it is unofficially announced, is to be the new viceroy of Canton, is anti-foreign.

Unless the allies protest the friendly viceroys are likely to have no friends left in China.

The only method for dealing with the situation not involving the division of Chinese territory is through the friendly viceroys, gradually removing the throne from the power of the Boxer leaders.

Americans on the spot believe that the settlement of the present question will decide the fate of an enormous and increasing American and Chinese trade.

WILL GERMANY SUBMIT TO COERCION

Suggestion is Made That Salisbury's Formal Reply is Withheld Pending an Effort to Effect a Compromise With the Kaiser.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—The statement that Lord Salisbury had verbally answered the German ambassador, Count von Hatzfeldt-Wildenburg, in the same terms as the United States government used in replying to the German note regarding China has called forth many denials throughout Europe. In the first place, it may be reiterated that Tuesday last the British premier told the German ambassador here that Germany's idea of the surrender of the authors of the outrages as a precedent to peace negotiations was not feasible, and in doing so, Lord Salisbury employed terms similar to those used in the note from Washington.

Though this was intended as a refusal of what is regarded in Downing street as the really important feature of the German note, it was not accepted as such by the German ambassador, on the ground that Lord Salisbury did not formally answer the note, and left the latter part of the German proposal (that the ministers at Peking should designate the offenders), unanswered, sending an hourly expected message from Sir Claude MacDonald, the British minister at Peking. The British foreign office has issued what may be taken in London to be a denial of the statement made to the Associated Press, saying that the British answer has "not yet been sent." This was especially set forth in the dispatch announcing Lord Salisbury's reply to the German ambassador, and it was added that the answer might not be sent for several days.

There is no reason to believe that the awaited message from Peking will have any bearing on Lord Salisbury's determination to agree with the United States in refusing to consent to the only proposition of any weight contained in the German note, though the formal announcement of such disagreement may be stayed off at the last moment by proceeding from the position one has taken

up and submitting to a compromise. If such is the case (and the German ambassador in London has already hinted to the Associated Press that it might come about), it is only natural that Berlin and other capitals in accord with Germany, will use every effort to conceal the fact that Germany was coerced into a compromise arrangement by the action of Great Britain and the United States.

Count von Hatzfeldt-Wildenburg was not the only recipient of Lord Salisbury's views on Tuesday, for during the usual foreign office reception several foreign representatives sounded the premier on Great Britain's attitude toward the German proposal, and they were all satisfied Lord Salisbury's decision was against Germany.

They Seek Freedom.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—Three Molkan delegates from Southern Russia have arrived here from Ottawa, accompanied by Frank Pedley, the superintendent of immigration for the Dominion government. The purpose of the visit is to make arrangements with the Canadian Pacific railway for the transportation next winter of 7000 of their compatriots who intend to leave the czar's dominions in southern Russia to settle in the Canadian northwest. As soon as satisfactory arrangements have been completed, the immigrants will begin to arrive.

The Molkans are spoken of as a highly desirable class of settlers, industrious and frugal, with a knowledge of farming and rudimentary handicrafts. They hold peculiar religious tenets. They are Christians and their views are obnoxious to the ruling authorities in Russia. Their ideas of social and family life are similar to that much persecuted section of Russian Jews. They do not object to military service, but they have long suffered under Russian oppression, and are looking forward to a period when they can establish themselves under free institutions.
