WOULD NOT AGREE TO ARBITRATION

Railway Men Regard It as Too One-Sided.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Whether or not the demand made by the miners will be granted by the operators was a question upon which definite information was not obtainable in this city yesterday. Efforts were made to see W. H. Truesdale, president of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad; E. B. Thomas, president of the Erie Railroad, and Alfred Walter, president of the Lehigh Valley, but reporters who visited their homes were informed that all three of them were away from town.

The coincidence of their absence from the city upon the same day led to the presumption that they had been called away to attend some conference to consider the men's demands, but other officials of the companies who were seen professed to have no knowledge of the holding of any meeting by the heads of the coal-carrying railroads. The three companies referred to will be largely concerned in any decision that may be reached as to the acceptance or refusal of the terms formulated by the strikers. Another dominant factor in the deliberations of the operators who control the situation would be R. M. Oliphant, president of the Delaware & Hudson Coal Company, but he is lying seriously ill at his home in this city, and can take no part in the controversy.

Some of the individual operators who were seen said that they had no idea of what attitude the railroads would take, but they agreed that whatever action was determined upon by the coal carrying roads would of necessity receive the acquiescence of the individual mineowners. More than one of the independent operators expressed the opinion that the railroads would not agree to arbitration, inasmuch as such an agreement would be one-sided in the face of the readiness which the men had manifested, as shown in the instance of the employees of the Markle mine, to disregard, when it suited their purpose, contracts which provide for the settlement of disputes by arbitration.

"Nor do I think, one of the independent operators said in discussing the situation, "that the mineowners will consent to bind themselves to pay so large an increase until April 1, when the falling off in the demand for coal, which always occurs in the Spring, might very greatly reduce prices.

"While I do not think that the demand to abolish the sliding scale would in itself be rejected by the operators, if that had been the only additional concession asked for, I am inclined to believe that the answer of the railroads to the men will be that they have made their offer, and will not go beyond it, or, in other words, the miners must either be contented with the present proffered advance of 10 per cent in wages, or remain idle."

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Oct. 15.—F. E. Nordyke, of the Wide Hollow district, has been experimenting in the growing of peanuts. He planted one-half acre in the Virginia nuts this season, and has made a success in growing some fine specimens. The crop matured thoroughly, and the nuts are of the finest flavor. The experiment will open up a new agricultural avenue for small farmers and market gardeners, and Yakima valley may become one of the great peanut-growing districts of the Northwest.

Suicide at State Asylum.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 15.—John F. Adams, an asylum patient, who was received from Jackson county in 1896, committed suicide this morning by hanging himself from a steampipe, with a rope made of a strip torn from a blanket.

Adams was 51 years old, and was in the asylum on his third commitment. He was a man of quiet manner, and had never given indication of suicidal propensities. He had been confined in the infirmary ward, and slept with a fellow-patient in a room adjoining the main sleeping apartment.

Worked the Wrong Way.

WOODBURN, Oct. 15.—John A. Jeffrey, populist, addressed a small number here Saturday afternoon. The effort was to gain votes for Bryan, but the sentiments expressed by the speaker made votes for McKinley. Mr. Jeffrey advocated relinquishment of the Philippines to Aguinaldo and his followers. Several ex-volunteers present left the hall in disgust.

COUNTRY SAFE FOR M'KINLEY

Declares Ex-Senator Mitchell. After a Tour of Observation in Several States.

Ex-Senator John H. Mitchell has returned from the East, says the Telegram. "There is no doubt about the election of McKinley," said the senator when he today in the hotel corridors at the Dalles. He speaks from observation, while away, he visited Washington, C., the New England states and most of the important states of the Middle West. His statements, therefore, are those of one who has had his finger upon the political pulse of the country.

"Everywhere," continued Mr. Mitchell, "the preponderance of sentiment is in favor of McKinley. I talked with merchants, business men and other people who are in touch with even the remotest classes, and they all concede that McKinley's election is assured."

"How about the German vote in the Middle West, upon which the Bryanites are banking?" was asked.

"From what I could learn," replied Mr. Mitchell, "disappointment awaits the Bryanites following there. Most of the potential Germans of New York state, including all the old families, will vote for McKinley. From these Germans in other states of the Union take their cue. As the New York Germans vote, will the majority of the Germans in other states vote."

"In short, the people generally believe that McKinley will win. All the conservative business element is strong for McKinley. There are comparatively few desperadoes all over the country who do not care to try any of the political experiments by voting for a candidate who is pledged to upset the political status quo that have created this opportunity."

Shields and His Men Rescued. WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The following account of the rescue of Captain Shields and his command from the Filipinos has been received at the war department: Manila, (no date).—Adjutant-General, Washington: Information from the Dalles just received that Captain

Shields and forty-eight men, Company E, Twenty-ninth Regiment, U. S. V., Infantry; two corporals, Company C, Twenty-ninth Regiment; one civilian, American negro, who were prisoners in hands of insurgents, have been turned over to General Luther R. Hare. More particulars soon, giving names of killed and wounded." MAC ARTHUR.

Luzon Has Been Thoroughly Pacified. New York, Oct. 15.—Lieutenant Edward Flaherty, who has recently been honorably discharged from the army after recovering from illness contracted with the Twenty-seventh Infantry in the Philippines, believes that the island of Luzon has been thoroughly pacified.

"There are no Filipinos fighting against the United States now," said he last night, "save struggling bands of robbers or ladrones. They are still thick in several provinces, and were noticeably numerous in the Province of Morong until the Twenty-seventh Infantry drove them out in a campaign ending with the battle of Tamay last January.

"All the Filipinos, except the Tagalos, are in favor of American supremacy. Some of the Filipinos have actually turned their arms against the Ladrones and killed some of them. It is feasible to supplant a large number of soldiers there with natives enlisted in the American service, and it ought to be done to spare our men. The Ladrones obey to a large extent the orders of Aguinaldo, though their bands are widely spread."

That International Boundary Line. NEW WHATCOM, Wash., Oct. 15.—News was received here today that the dominion surveyors who have been engaged in an effort to locate the international boundary line where it passes through the Mount Baker mining district in Whatcom county, abandoned their work on October 9th and left the country. According to their field notes, the line passes two miles south of where it was always supposed to have run, which their scientific observations place the 49th parallel, which is the boundary line, within a quarter of a mile of where it is always supposed to have been.

Should the field notes stand in the majority, the finest mining properties in the country will be on the Canadian side. The matter will undoubtedly have to be made the subject of negotiations between the two governments as to where the line shall be.
