

Suicide at State Asylum.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 15 .- John F. Adams, an asylum patient, who was received from Jackson county in 1896, committed suicide this morning by hanging himself from a steampipe, with a rope made of a strip torn from a blanket.

Adams was 51 years old, and was in the asylum on his third commitment. He was a man of quiet manner, and had never given indication of suicidal propensities. He had been confined in the infirmary ward, and slept with a fellowpatient in a room adjoining the main sleeping apartment.
