BRYAN'S CHANCES SLIM.

Mr. Bryan says that every trust is bad, that every monopoly is bad and ought to be smashed. That is what is really going to overwhelm him in the election, says the Salt Lake Tribune, for there is much truth in what Mr. Stanchfield, the democratic candidate for governor of New York, says, for he confesses that the combines which Mr. Bryan is denouncing "represent every important industry in the land."

Already, too, many manufacturers are beginning to prepare for what may come in case of a populist triumph, and all these things are having their effect on voters. This thought is dawning on millions of minds: "McKinley's election would carry with it no menace to any industry between the seas; Bryan's election would mean paralysis to business."

That knowledge will decide the election. The people think with Eckles, "What is the use of electing a president who will have to be put under bonds to insure the country against loss?"

The tide has turned, and Mr. Bryan will drift further and further from success every day up to November 6th.

HAS THE JOURNAL FLOPPED?

Even the Salem Journal, that used to be one of the most rabidly radical free silver advocates in the state, has "flopped" on the money question to the extent, at least, that it insists on the election of a United States senator, who will maintain the existing standard of money so as "to insure security and stability in our financial affairs,"—remarkable language for a paper that used to insist that the "security and stability" of our financial affairs depended on free coinage at 16 to 1. The Journal says:

"Oregon should send a man to the senate who is a positive quality and as this is a republican legislature we shall advocate the election of a man who will maintain the present standard and currency system as a matter of principle to insure security and stability in our financial affairs. The gold standard is established in theory only. We still have a credit paper system resting on the fiat and promise of parity, with nearly four times as much currency as there is gold to redeem it with. The money question was the issue in 1896 and should not be disturbed by electing trimmers and uncertainties to the senate."

Does Mr. Bryan know the company he keeps? asks the New York Press, that ought to know what it is talking about. Is he aware who is paying his way? Is he cognizant of the methods by which the vast sums have been collected necessary to make his visit, with its enormous demonstration of bands, banners and red fire, with its trained hosts of marching mercenaries, the lavish climax of the most costly campaign that the city of New York has ever beheld? Does he know that the price of his barbarically magnificent welcome is wrung out of the poverty and extorted from the vice of New York? Does he know that this pageantry which greets him is an item in the expense of an extra-municipal government which, in absorbed attention to its primary function of working for my own

pocket every time, is choking the hospitals with loathsome disease, the prisons with criminal youth, the potter's field with an ever-growing train of nameless and dishonored dead? Does Mr. Bryan, in brief, realize that he is getting a part of the proceeds of the "Cost of Tammany Hall in Flesh and Blood?"

The New York World is frank, anyhow, says the Oregonian. It publishes the result of a canvass of its own establishment on the presidential question, from which it appears that a majority of those employed in its editorial department are for McKinley, the leading editorial writers standing four for McKinley to one for Bryan. This looks as if the World's editors didn't take much stock in their own editorial counsel.
