Four teaspoonfuls of liquid make one tablespoonful.
Four tablespoonfuls of liquid, one gill or a quarter of a cup.
A tablespoonful of liquid, half an ounce.
A pint of liquid weighs a pound.
A quart of sifted flour, one pound.
Three kitchen cupfuls of cornmeal, one pound.
Four kitchen cupfuls of flour, one pound.
One cup of butter, half a pound.
One solid pint of chopped meat, one pound.
A dash of pepper, an eighth of a teaspoonful.
A pint of brown sugar, thirteen ounces.
Two cupfuls and a half of powdered sugar, one pound—Ladies' Home Journal.
