VAUGHN MAKES A CONFESSION

He Is Now in Jail at Salem. Having Waived Examination This Morning—His Victim is Conscious But Probably Cannot Live.

SALEM, Oct. 24.—Clyde Vaughn, who attempted to murder Lulu Jones, at Jefferson, yesterday, and escaped to the woods, was captured last evening about two miles from Jefferson, in the direction of Marion, by Frank Libby, a farmer, who saw the fellow and headed him off. He confessed to the crime, but gave no motive for it.

He says when she came out of the schoolhouse he tried to persuade her to go into the basement with him, which she refused, whereupon he struck her a blow with his fist, stunning her. He then made up his mind to kill her, so he dragged her into the basement and struck her with the poll of the ax.

An erroneous report yesterday was that the girl was 16 years old and Vaughn 18 years, but it transpires that she was only 14 years of age, while he is nearly 21 years. He is a morose, stubborn, unsocial young fellow, subject to fits of melancholy. He has been insanely in love with this girl for two years past, but she paid no attention to him.

The district attorney filed an information in Justice Johnson's court, at Jefferson, charging Vaughn with attempted murder, and his preliminary examination takes place today.

Jefferson and vicinity is in a state of great excitement over the terrible crime and if Miss Jones had died last night, the probabilities are the state might have been saved the trouble of a trial.

JEFFERSON, Oct. 24.—Clyde Vaughn, the murderous assailant of Lulu Jones, was arraigned this morning before Justice Johnson, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. He waived examination, was committed to the county jail, and was immediately taken to Salem in a carriage by Constable Blackwell.

This charge is preferred simply to hold him, awaiting the result of the girl's injuries.

Miss Jones is still alive, but in very bad condition, and it is thought she is making a heroic battle for life. She has sufficient consciousness to recognize members of the family and talk a little.

ALBANY, Oct. 24.—Lulu Jones, the little 14-year-old school girl who was struck in the head with an ax by Clyde Vaughn, the janitor of the Jefferson public school building, is still living, but the physicians say she will not live long.

Miss Jones was well known in this city and was a bright young lady. Her sister is a teacher in the Albany public schools. Louis Jones, of the Corvallis & Eastern Railway, is a brother.

He Feels Grateful.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Lord Salisbury's explanations of the motives of the Anglo-German alliance will find a sympathetic hearing at Balmoral, says the Tribune's London correspondent. It is a current saying that the only person of whom the German Emperor stands in awe is his grandmother, Queen Victoria. He is influenced by her, and she has a strong affection for him. Her sympathies have always been excited when England and Germany have been working together in diplomacy.

The two governments already had a secret understanding respecting African schemes of partition before this fresh agreement was made, and many of the best informed men in the diplomatic world have been convinced that it also includes possible contingencies in the Far East. It is not indeed a new thing for Lord Salisbury to make a secret arrangement with continental powers.

What is unusual is the particular manner in which this fresh compact has been sprung upon Europe. That baffles conjecture.

CHINA'S TERMS OF SETTLEMENT

Proposal by Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang.

New York, Oct. 24.—A dispatch to the Herald from Peking says:

A preliminary convention between China and the combined powers has been proposed by Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang. It is as follows:

"Article I. Laying siege to the legations of foreign ministers is a high offense against one of the important principles of international law. No country can possibly tolerate such a thing. China acknowledges her great fault in this respect and promises that it will never occur again.

"Article II. China admits her liability to pay an indemnity for the various losses sustained on this occasion, and the powers will each appoint officials to examine and present all claims for a final consultation and settlement.

"Article III. As to future trade and general international relations, each power should designate how these matters are to be dealt with, whether the old treaties should continue or new conventions should be made, slightly adding to the old treaties or canceling the old treaties and negotiating new ones. Any of these plans may be adopted and when China has approved them, special regulations can be made in each case as required.

"Article IV. This convention will be made by China with the combined powers to cover the general principles which apply alike to all. This settled, the foreign ministers will remove the seals they caused to be placed in various parts of the Taung li Yamun and the Yamun ministers may go the Yamun and attend to business as usual. And further, each power should arrange its own special affairs with China, so that separate treaties may be settled in due order. When the various items of indemnity are all arranged properly, or an understanding has been reached about them, the powers will successively withdraw their troops.

"Article V. The troops sent to China by the powers are for the protection of the ministers, and no other purpose, so

when the negotiations begin for treaties of peace each power should first declare an armistice."

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—W. A. H. Martin, of the University of Peking, who is at his home here, said of the China problem: "The best remedy for the situation is the re-establishment of the young emperor, who possesses liberal and progressive ideas. If he cannot be put on the throne, one of two things will follow: Either native Princes will divide the country, or foreign powers will cut it up and rule through native Princes. The latter, I believe, would be the better of the two."

Anarchists to Welcome Emma Goldman.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—The various groups of anarchists in New York are in a flutter over the announcement that Emma Goldman, the woman anarchist, who has been engaged in a propaganda throughout Europe for about a year, will return to New York about the middle of next month. Her return was hastened by the authorities stopping a proposed international convention of anarchists in Europe, at which the different groups of "reds" were to have given their ideas on the "propaganda of deed," which the counseling of violent measures is called. American anarchists were to have been represented at the convention by James Morton, of San Francisco; William and Lizzie Jones, of Chicago; Dr. Cohn, of Chicago, and Emma Goldman.

Meetings of committees are to be held to arrange for an itinerary for Emma Goldman, who is going to deliver "anarchist lectures" all over the United States when she arrives here.

Novel Music in Honor of Roosevelt.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—One of the most novel musical features ever attempted in this city is being arranged for Friday night, at Madison Square Garden, for the demonstration in Governor Roosevelt's honor. A score or more of bands will unite in playing "The Star Spangled Banner," and the time will be beaten for all the bands in sight of Madison Square by a searchlight on the tower of Madison Square Garden. This giant baton of light will be manipulated by an experienced musical director and the volume of music is expected to be something extraordinary.

Situation in South China.

CANTON, Oct. 24.—According to official reports, all the cities in the Hui Chow prefecture are still holding out, the rebels confining themselves to capturing villages and slaughtering isolated bodies of imperial troops. The rebels are actively recruiting and are now estimated to number 10,000. There has been no pitched battle. The Chinese general commanding at Hui Chow is afraid to leave the city for fear of being cut off.
