Died—At Victor last Tuesday, Oct. 26, Mr. E. B. Martin. Mr. Martin came to Victor eleven or twelve years ago, and was well liked and respected by all who knew him. He leaves two daughters, one son and several grand-children to mourn his loss. His remains were followed to their last resting place in the Victor cemetery by a large concourse of neighbors and friends.

F. W. Silvertooth, of Antelope, was in town one day this week. Mr. Silvertooth was in search of a couple of "shovers of the queer," who belonged to a gang of six counterfeiters who infested Antelope during the fair last week and succeeded in passing about \$600 in that place. Four of the gang were arrested before they could get away, the other two were traced to Kingsley by Mr. Silvertooth, where all traces of them were lost. The spurious coin were of the denomination of silver halves and dollars and twenty dollar gold pieces.

**Miners Go to Work Monday.**  
SCRANTON, Pa., Oct. 26.—There is great rejoicing today all through Scranton and the Lackawanna valley at the calling off of the anthracite miners' strike. The order has had the effect of stimulating the companies which had not already posted notices agreeing to advance wages 10 per cent to do so, and today the Pennsylvania Coal company sent out its official notice to its miners at Danmore, Avoca and Pittston. Like action was also taken by the Moosic Coal company, and this evening will find the notice up at every mine in the valley from Forest City to Pittston. Fifty-three thousand men and boys between these points will therefore resume work on Monday. Today the mining companies have forces engaged getting the mines in shape for resumption on Monday. At the mines all the sidings are filled with cars and the shipments of coal are certain to be large before another week ends.

Cape Town, Oct. 26.—The Boers have captured Jacobstad, southwest of Kimberley, after a stubborn resistance upon the part of the garrison, which consisted of a detachment of Cape Town Highlanders. The latter suffered severely, losing thirty-four out of fifty-two.

Paris, Oct. 26.—Dr. Leyds, Transvaal agent, was questioned today with reference to plans of former President Kruger. He said:

"Most of the stories published on the subject are imaginary. Mr. Kruger will land at Marseilles, and I shall go to meet him. It is not true that I have seen M. Delcasse, French minister of foreign affairs, or that I am in any way arranging a reception, which will be entirely in the hands of the French themselves. Nothing has been definitely decided as to the details of Kruger's stay in Europe. But Mr. Kruger is an old man and not accustomed to a cold climate, so it is likely he will sojourn in the neighborhood of Nice for the winter. I have no reason to believe there is any ground for the statement that Kruger intends to visit President McKinley."
