

IS VIRTUALLY AN ALLIANCE

Understanding of Britain and Germany—Queen's Death Has Brought Closest Possible Relations.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: The presentation of the Blue Ribbon of the Garter by King Edward to the Crown Prince of Germany was a fresh proof of the cordiality of the relations between the two royal families. King Edward has opened his reign by emphasizing, in the strongest way, his personal friendship for the German emperor, and this was perhaps necessary, because there was a different feeling not long ago, when William II was not persona grata in royal circles here.

The queen's death has, indeed, brought England and Germany into the closest possible relations. The German emperor's conduct during the South African war opened the way for a better understanding, but the popular apprehension of his devotion to the queen was needed in order to justify what is now in the air—a virtual alliance between Germany and England, not only in China, but also in Europe.

Germany is England's most formidable industrial and commercial rival in Europe, but while protecting her own productive interests she is now secured against any hostile demonstration against her manufacturers in this market, and "made in Germany" will not longer be a derisive outcry. The king has always been popular in France, and the new reign opens with a better feeling between the neighbors across the channel than has existed for many years. It may be transitory, but the king's name is one to conjure with in France.

Anglo-American relations have been sweetened by the unique tributes to the president and the state legislatures to the queen's character and virtues. Lord Lansdowne is reported to have consulted the king at Osborne respecting the canal treaty, but there is no definite evidence of it. No English voice is raised against the acceptance of the amendments. The settlement of the canal controversy will be generally welcomed here. The time

is not auspicious for international re-entiments and points of diplomatic dignity.

Thirty Years at Hard Labor.
PATERSON, N. J., Jan. 29.—Walter C. McAllister, William A. Death and Andrew J. Campbell, who were found guilty of murder in the second degree for the killing of Jennie Boeschlieter on October 18, 1900, by the administration of chloral and subsequent rape, together with George J. Kerr, who pleaded non-vult contumacia to a charge of rape, were brought into court of Oyer and Terminer here today for sentence by Judge Dixon. McAllister, Campbell and Death were each sentenced to 30 years' imprisonment at hard labor, and Kerr to 15 years' imprisonment at hard labor. The sentences are the full terms of imprisonment which the law provides.

To Enjoy the Big Prize-Fight.
CINCINNATI, Jan. 29.—The suit to enjoin the proposed Jeffries-Ruhlin contest was filed in the court of common pleas today. The application for an injunction was not made at that time. Judge Hollister, who is sitting in the common pleas room No. 1, where the hearing will be had, will be asked several days later to issue an injunction. In the interim notices will be served on the defendants.

The legal ground upon which this action is taken is that the proposed affair would be in every sense a public nuisance.

Russia is Offering Secret Terms to China.
NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—A dispatch to the Herald from Shanghai says: Russia is secretly offering the following terms in regard to Manchuria:

No money compensation to be demanded for losses in Manchuria; Manchuria to be restored to China, and the official power to be Chinese. Russian officers to administer Manchuria, with power to receive all war material, forts,

and so forth; no arms, forces or arsenals to be allowed in Manchuria; China to allow sufficient Russian forces to remain for the protection of Russian railways.

These terms are refused by the Tartar General, Tseng Chi. Li Hung Chang is urging the appointment of a pro-Russian commissioner who will accept the proffered terms, and he has requested the execution of General Tseng Chi, who was the instigator of the attack on the Russian frontier.

For Building of Canal.
BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 29.—In the house tonight, Mounce and Treloch, of Nez Perces, presented a memorial to congress asking an appropriation for building a canal around the Dalles and Ceillo rapids, making the Columbia and Snake rivers navigable and opening to transportation facilities the Inland Empire. The canal would open the timber and other resources of the Grand Ronde, Clearwater and other important sections.

Scott of Kootenai presented a memorial asking that a branch of the National Soldiers' Home be established at Fort Douglas.

Three measures passed the house—making the killing of livestock by a corporation prima facie evidence of negligence; compelling Indian children to attend state schools, and giving county commissioners power to levy special road taxes.

A bill to amend the Boise City charter was presented by Representative Yeats. Its principal provision is that the city may levy special taxes. The city did this last year, but the courts would not sustain the action.

Indian Uprising a Pure Fake.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The war department has received the following telegram from Brigadier-General Fitzhugh Lee, commanding the department of the Missouri, in regard to the Indian troubles:

Omaha, Jan. 28.—Adjutant-General, Washington: Lieutenant Dixon, commanding Troop A, Eighth cavalry, Henrietta, I. T., reports no violence by Indians and no excitement at Holdenville and Eufaula; people not leaving their homes; go anywhere without fear. Chitto Harjo (Crazy Snake) was arrested yesterday without difficulty by Deputy Johnson, and now is held at Henrietta. Dixon instructed to give necessary protection to prevent destruction of railway or bridges. So far no acts of violence verified.

When he found that it referred to the third house bill passed so many times at the famous "hold-up" it is said the senator swore vengeance on the Hillsboro jokers.
