PROSPERITY IN PORTO RICO

Governor Allen Says There is No Starvation or Destitution There.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The secretary of the navy has received an interesting letter from Governor Allen, of Porto Rico, formerly assistant secretary of the navy, which sets at naught the alarming reports of dire distress and poverty among the islanders, and chronicles a constantly growing measure of prosperity in Porto Rico. In part the letter is as follows:

"The anti-American sentiment, which was prevalent at the beginning of the civil government, has entirely disappeared and the masses of the people were never more contented, I am sure, than at the present time. More are employed than ever before, and at better wages, and indeed there is a scarcity of labor in certain sections, and contractors complain that they are unable to secure sufficient help, although they are paying 50 cents in gold, where ten months ago they paid 30 cents in pesetas. The crops are abnormally large and of excellent quality.

"Our customs receipts are constantly increasing, as well as the internal revenue collections. All our bills are promptly paid; we have always a surplus in the treasury, and we shall finish the fiscal year, which expires June 30, entirely within our budget allowances, so I feel sure the president can have reason for great satisfaction with the results in Porto Rico. Civil government in Porto Rico has not cost the people of the United States one penny. It has been self-sustaining from the beginning. The island is rich, and is sure to prove a valuable asset of the United States.

"As to 'destitution' and 'starvation' in Porto Rico, they do not exist, and with the abundant crops and plenty of labor at hand, if there should be a case of starvation here, it might properly be called a case of suicide."

Effort to Unseat Wilcox.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—George Geer, an attorney from Honolulu, today filed formal protest before the house committee of elections against the seating of Robert Wilcox, as a delegate from

Hawaii. He charges there existed no law for holding the election of delegate; that Wilcox, in 1883, married Gina Sobrero, in Turin, Italy, separated from her, and without a divorce, married in 1896, Theresa Cartwright. Wilcox obtained no divorce from his wife until 1900.

It is alleged that in 1895 Wilcox was convicted of treason against the republic of Hawaii and sentenced to be hanged, which sentence was commuted to 35 years in prison. He was subsequently pardoned; that his anti-election speeches were strongly anti-American; that he offered his services to Aginaldo to fight against the United States.

Has Union Purchased Southern Pacific?

New York, Feb. 1.—Reports are current in Wall street that the Union Pacific railroad has acquired control of the Southern Pacific company. Acting Vice-President Gates, of the Southern Pacific, says he knows nothing about the report. It is said that the Harriman interests in the Union Pacific have bought the Huntington holders in the Southern Pacific, amounting to 400,000 shares at a price something like \$55, paid or to be paid.

Later it was reported that the Southern Pacific holdings bought by the Harriman syndicate were those in the hands of Speyer & Co. No official confirmation of the report could be obtained.

A news agency sent out the following statement this afternoon:

"It may be stated on semi-official authority that the Harriman syndicate, acting in the interest of the Union Pacific, has purchased the Speyer-Huntington holdings in the Southern Pacific."

IN HANDS OF VIGILANTES

Violence to Be Suppressed in New York Potter's Committee Will Begin Work in Ten Days.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—The Journal and Advertiser says: New York City will be in the hands of a vigilance committee within ten days from now. This committee will consist of several hundred men. Bishop Potter, it was said, had consented to start this movement, his advice in the matter mapping out the city and selection of the vigilantes having been followed as far as consistent with the objects in view.

Every member of the 15 has pledged himself to secrecy. Chairman Baldwin says there has already been too much talking and not enough action. The Borough of Manhattan has been divided into districts, each of which will be assigned to a group of vigilantes. No part of the city is to be wholly neglected. Even on Fifth avenue or in the upper West Side members of the committee will prosecute their labors.

The vigilantes will confine themselves to the observance of things in general. These duties require them to see whether policemen are performing their duty, whether the streets are kept clean, whether saloons are allowed to do business after the legal closing hours and whether such saloons, gambling-houses and poolrooms are visited by policemen, either in uniform or civilian dress.

The committee of 15 will provide a "clearing house," to which all reports will be made, and through which the results of the work may be made available.

Bold Hold-up at Goble.

ST. HELENS, Or., Jan. 31.—Sheriff Holton was this morning called to Goble to investigate a hold-up. Last night T. G. Parker and a companion from Hood River who had purchased tickets for Astoria at Portland, stopped off at Goble, intending to take the Northern Pacific from there to their home in Seattle. They were walking up and down the railroad track opposite the transfer landing, Parker walking a little in advance of his companion, when he was suddenly confronted by a man with a 38-caliber revolver. He grabbed the gun and wrenched it from the footpad, but while so doing

was assaulted with a knife. He received a severe cut on the left cheek. At first he thought his throat had been cut, and he became unconscious. Before help could be summoned the assailant had fled, leaving his gun. Parker continued on his way home, and as he was unable to give any clue to the highwayman, the matter was dropped.

COWES, Isle of Wight, Feb. 1.—The funeral started from Osborne House at 1:40 p. m. The coffin reached the Alberts at 2:25. Great, silent crowds witnessed the progress of the procession to the pier. After the body had been embarked on the Alberta, King Edward boarded the royal yacht in a launch and the procession started. The Alberta started from Cowes at 2:25 p. m.

Previous to the removal of the Queen's remains the Bishop of Winchester held a service in the Chapelle Ardente.

The ceremony in bringing the coffin from Osborne House to the pier at Cowes, was scarcely less interesting than the naval function. At noon the gorgeous trappings of the Chapelle Ardente were distributed. Over the coffin was thrown the coronation robe worn by the girl queen. On this was placed the royal regalia, wand, scepter and crown, which were scarcely ever used by the queen in her lifetime. Dummy regalia will be buried with her at Frogmore.
