At the adjourned term of county court held this week J. H. Jackson was appointed constable for The Dalles precinct to succeed F. N. Hill, who was elected last June, but whose bonds the court failed to approve.

Governor Geer has proclaimed a half-holiday on the afternoon of Monday, February 4, 1901, for the public observance of the centennial of the day upon which Chief Justice John Marshall began his judicial career.

Some one gave the editor of an esteemed contemporary the hind quarters of a coon, and he says that ever since eating it he has experienced peculiar sensations, such as a longing to chase chickens and climb trees, prowl around nights and suck eggs.

Bishop Morris will conduct services at St. Paul's Episcopal church next Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The hour for service has been changed in order that the bishop may leave for Portland on the afternoon train. All those not worshipping elsewhere are cordially invited to attend.

"Oregon needs a constitutional convention to make just one amendment—to exclude men with larger than 7x9 mouths from the legislature," remarks the pop editor of a Salem paper, who was in the '97 legislative hold-up to the neck, and whose own mouth would exceed the constitutional limitation two inches to one.

This is ground-hog day and as the sun shone out bright and clear till about nine o'clock and then hid behind a thick and impenetrable bank of clouds, the question naturally arose, At what hour does the ground-hog come out of his hole? R. F. Wickham, of Dutch Flat, was arrested today on a bench warrant issued out of Justice Brownhill's court, and is confined in the county jail. Wickham was found guilty last fall of larceny of hay from a neighbor and fined \$25 or a month in jail. He begged the justice to give him time to pay the fine, and the justice suspended the sentence. Since then, however, Wickham has apparently made no effort to pay his fine, and the justice getting tired of waiting for something that never came, had him put in jail. Wickham's attorneys, Messrs. Moore & Gavin, were trying to get him out this afternoon on a writ of habeas corpus, but had not succeeded at the time of going to press.

### Doings at Oregon's Capital.

[Special Correspondence.] Two weeks of balloting has passed and the legislative assembly of the state is no nearer to the election of a United States senator than it was at the first vote. Practically the same vote is cast now as was cast then, and no material changes have been made at any time. Still there exists an undercurrent of unrest, which is plainly visible to the casual observer. This spirit of restlessness is expected by many to develop and become so great that it will cause a sort of revolution in the ranks of the present candidates for senatorial honors and result in the election of some such man as M. C. George, John H. Mitchell or some other political leader of the old school. Binger Herman is expected by many to carry off the prize. Since Mr. Corbett made the boast that he would be elected or prevent the election of anyone else, there seems to have arisen a desire to eliminate him from the race and place some other name in nomination.

The leader in the house of representatives is always a man of refinement, honor, nerve, good common sense, and one who is versatile and full of good fellowship. Hon. B. L. Eddy, of Tillamook, possesses these qualities in a large degree, and is easily the leader of the majority. In the man who stands as a peer among his fellow men in the senate these same qualities are needful; yet to be a leader in that body does not require quite so much of the power to command as is required in a leader of the house, since in the former body there are only one half as many members as our found in the latter. In the upper house Senator B. F. Mulkey is recognized as one of its most able members. The gentleman, while not in direct harmony with the organization of the senate, holds the honor of standing on his merits, and of leaving an enviable record behind to bear silent witness to his honest efforts to work in the interests of the common people.
