

"WRONG" BUT USEFUL.

Protection may be theoretically wrong, says the Bristol, English, Times, but that it is practically useful in its workings is again shown by an official report—this time from our consul at Chicago. This report refers to the tin plate industry, and the figures quoted are not only interesting, but also significant and disquieting. Down to 1891 the manufacture of tin plate was practically unknown in the states, which used to import about 600 million pounds a year, nearly all from the United Kingdom, and much of it from South Wales and the Forest of Dean. In 1891 the McKinley Tariff Act came into force, and the succeeding years have seen a steady and rapid reduction in the quantity of imported tin plates, and a corresponding increase in the home production. The 600,000,000 pounds sent to America by us in 1892 has shrunk down to about 100,000,000 pounds, while the tin plates made in the States have increased from nothing in 1891 to 800,000,000 pounds in 1898. Ten years ago there were no tin plate mills in the States; now there are over 300. It is scarcely surprising, under the circumstances, that our tin plate mills are idle, and that thousands of our tin plate workers are out of work.

Speaking of the tactics that the Simon-Corbett ring adopted in 1897 to defeat the re-election of Senator Mitchell, the Oregonian of yesterday says: "The remedy was unusual, perhaps indefensible, because the emergency was unusual, perhaps insufferable." The "emergency" was the certain election of a man who was the choice of a majority of the members of the legislature as well as of the people who elected them. The "remedy" was a conspiracy to defeat the will of the people by preventing the organization of the house. The remedy was simple anarchy and the hardest word that the Oregonian, which boasts of its independence and political morality, has to say of it is that it was "perhaps indefensible." It was villainous, revolutionary and unrepentant to the last degree, and the gang of unprincipled anarchists who conceived and executed it would now add insult to injury by rewarding the chief anarchist and financier of the movement with a seat in the highest branch of the national legislature.

Gov. Allen, of Porto Rico, reports a condition of general prosperity. Crops are unusually large, and wages, which were formerly 30 cents a day in silver, are now 50 cents a day in gold. "Civil government in Porto Rico," says Gov. Allen, "has not cost the people of the United States one penny. It has been self-sustaining from the beginning." Customs receipts are increasing and the treasury has a surplus. Democratic platform writers have no further use for Porto Rico.

An Oregon paper which is now found zealously supporting the senatorial aspirations of Mr. Corbett, had this to say of him in its issue of October 4, 1898: "His record for bribery and corrupt methods in 1872, 1896 and 1898 should forever damn him politically."
