WILL THE CUBANS YIELD?

President of the Cuban Constitutional Convention Says No—Resolution of Senate is Distasteful.

NEW YORK, March 2.—Mendez Capote, the president of the Cuban constitutional convention, is quoted in a dispatch to the World as saying, not in his own official capacity, but as a member of the convention, relative to the Cuban situation and the island's relations with the United States:

"I regret that the senate has passed a flat resolution. It is most distasteful and betrays a total misunderstanding of the situation of Secretary Root that the Cubans must agree to the concessions proposed.

"I do not believe that the convention will yield. Personally, I will never concede coaling stations or the right to control our foreign affairs. They would mean interference in local affairs at any time and also the maintenance of unheard-of relations. We ask only the fulfillment of the promise of the United States, which was accepted as it was made.

"I am surprised at the utterly false statement in the American press, which appears to be campaigning against us. It has systematically created the impression that we are ignoring President McKinley's expressed desires and failing to embody in the constitution his opinions as to the relations which should exist between Cuba and the United States. On the contrary, the convention was instructed to consider those opinions. Subsequently there was a further suppression of facts and a fabrication of statements in the attempt to convince Americans that we should accept the terms which Secretary Root presented. Having rejected those, the senate's action is intended to frighten us. Whether it will do so remains to be seen."

A demonstration has been planned for Sunday to show approval of the convention's attitude and to pledge support to its policy.

The Diario de la Marina commends the convention's action and says that the United States demands showed the be-

lief that there was an expressed desire on the part of the Cubans to make the concessions.

"That we should surrender our purses on demand would be no surprise, because, by force one is hanged. But that we should wish them taken is expecting too much. The delegates have been as logical and dignified as the government which rules by virtue of intervention."

Salt Combine Next.
LONDON, March 2.—The report in the London papers that the Salt Union of Great Britain will possibly be able at a meeting March 8th to announce a sort of combination with the National Salt Company of the United States of America, has aroused considerable interest. The agent in London of the National Salt Company informed a representative of the Associated Press today that he knows nothing of the suggested combine. He said: We believe American salt can be

sold in Great Britain cheaper than the native product, in spite of freight charges. We are already contracting for 2000 tons a month and certainly have not the slightest intention of combining with Great Britain. We are here to compete, not to combine."

Will Hermann Go?
WASHINGTON, March 2.—An afternoon paper says that Senator Shoup and a number of other western senators who want to see Binger Hermann retained as commissioner of the general land office, have spoken to the president about it. For several days past there have been more or less rumors in the air concerning the probability of Hermann being his own successor. There are some differences existing between the secretary of the interior and the commissioner of the general land office in which western senators generally support the commissioner. If Secretary Hitchcock remains in the cabinet, this friction may cause the retirement of Hermann. But more than all else that will settle the question will be the decision of Senator Mitchell when he arrives. Probably the house members of the Oregon delegation will endorse Hermann for retention, and it is believed that Senator Simon feels kindly toward him. If Mitchell insists, and the entire delegation should be in line for Hermann, he will remain unless the friction between himself and the secretary becomes too great to be withstood. Already the friends of Assistant Commissioner Richards, who is from Wyoming, and a Western man, are urging him Hermann's place, if there should be a vacancy.

Cubans to McKinley.
HAVANA, March 3.—Last evening, after the demonstration in front of the Marti Theater, where a torchlight procession composed of members of the national republican and popular parties were reviewed by the members of the convention, the procession, 5000 strong, went to the governor-general's palace, where a delegation presented to General Wood a petition to President McKinley urging absolute independence for Cuba. The demonstration was originally intended as a rebuke to the United States senate and house of Representatives for adopting the Cuban amendment, but no such feeling was displayed at the palace. The committee was cordially received by General Wood, and on retiring gave three cheers for the United States.

Carried Out On Lake Erie.
SILVER CREEK, N. Y., March 3.—Twenty-one fishermen were carried out on Lake Erie, off Silver Creek, tonight on floating ice, but seventeen of them were rescued. The other four were: Henry Turner, John George, James Mc-Nardie, Thomas Ludwig.

The last seven of the four men they were still on the ice, but a high wind was blowing up a big sea, and the ice was fast breaking up. They were about four miles about out, and there was a mile of open water between them and the shore. When it was found that the men were cut off from shore this morning a message was sent to Dunkirk by the mayor asking for assistance.

A special train was made up, and a party of rescuers brought a boat on a flat car. They worked heroically all day. The seventeen who were rescued were taken off the floating ice with great difficulty. They said that their comrades probably perished, as they were in perilous positions.

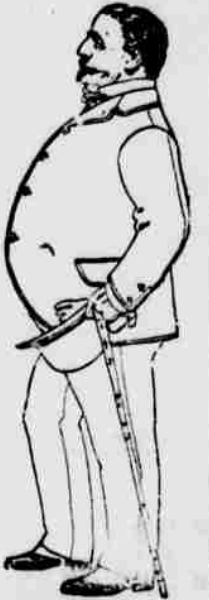
