The Hon. Edward Atkinson on a prodigious Alain oven on four wheels, cooks as he goes. Then we have the Hon. Carl Schurz in a revolving chair carried on the shoulders of Erving Winslow and Edwin Bur-

riett Smith, professor of the Chicago university in a six-ass drag brings up the rear.

If THE CHRONICLE felt in any way concerned in the governor's veto of the Portland charter bill it might rise to remark that it is a little singular that he should feel justified in vetoing a measure that was passed by a two-thirds vote of both houses, that was in no sense radical or revolutionary and that was confessedly the very thing the people of Portland voted for at the June election. The presumption is the people of Portland knew what they wanted as well as the governor did. But that is neither here nor there. It appears a few democrats would have got office under the new charter and that would never do, of course. The saloon men feel that with the charter bill vetoed and Malley side-tracked their Sunday business may still be run as they want it run, while with the legislature out of the way the gamblers look forward to concessions. And these are some of the glorious fruits, immediate and prospective, of the governor's veto of the charter bill.

The Roseburg Review, the leading democratic paper of Western Oregon, brands as political Judases the eleven democrats who helped to elect Senator Mitchell. Its reasoning, however, ought to give pause to those

who pretend that Mitchell bartered the principles of his party to gain democratic votes. The Review is not blinded in that way. It condemns the democrats in question because they voted for a man who, as the Review puts it, "has done more than any other man in recent years towards making Oregon a republican state, and this election will only give him more power to continue in the same work."
