INVITATION TO MCKINLEY

Governor Geer Carries Out the Wish of the Legislature Expressed By Joint Resolution.

SALEM, March 15.—By senate concurrent resolution No. 14, the last legislature gave a formal invitation to President McKinley to visit the state of Oregon, the same to be transmitted through the executive department of the state. Acting in accordance with said resolution, Governor Geer yesterday sent the following letter to the president:

"Hon. William McKinley, President, Washington, D. C.

"Dear Sir: By the terms of a concurrent resolution passed unanimously by the legislature of Oregon at its session just adjourned, I was requested to extend to you, on behalf of the state, an invitation to visit Oregon during your approaching trip to the Pacific coast. It is needless to assure you that I take great pleasure, both officially and personally, in complying with this request and promising on the part of all our people an unstinted welcome. A committee has been appointed by the legislative assembly, through whom you and your party will be shown the courtesies of the state, and assurance is hereby given that every moment of your stay among us will be made pleasant and, we hope, profitable, as the means of illustrating the resources, possibilities and necessities of this Western coast of our great country.

"T. T. Geer, Governor."

Accompanying the letter is a copy of the concurrent resolution, which was given The Telegram at the time of its adoption. The legislative committee provided for, and which was filed from both houses, is constituted as follows: Senators—President C. W. Fulton, Dr. W. Kuykendall and George C. Brownell.

Representatives—Speaker L. B. Reeder, A. S. Roberts, of Wasco; Colonel J. M. Poorman, of Marion; E. D. Briggs, of Jackson; Colonel John McCracken, of Multnomah.

Will Give Away \$25,000,000.
PITTSBURG, Pa., March 15.—The Dispatch says: Intimate friends of Andrew

Carnegie say that it is the intention of the steel master to give at least \$25,000,000 for the erection of buildings and for the endowment of the proposed technical school of Pittsburgh. It is also declared by those who have talked with Mr. Carnegie that he intends to make his school the finest of its kind in the world, and that it will lend as much fame to Pittsburgh on the theoretical side of the iron and steelmaking as his famous works have done in actual practice.

Dewet is Insane.

BLOEMFONTEIN, March 15.—Prisoners who have lately been released by General Dewet say they think he is a madman. They aver that the terrible fatigues he has undergone, his anxiety and the intensity of his feelings have unbalanced his mind. Apart from this view of Dewet's mental state, some of his peculiarities are that he rarely sleeps within the bounds of his camp. He seeks rest outside with a few trusted followers. Thus the orderlies of his subordinate commanders are frequently unable to find him to receive orders. His secrecy is extreme. He absolutely imparts his plans to no one. Dewet repudiates the peace negotiations which are going on. He declares openly to the men that no terms except independence will satisfy him. A recent utterance attributed to him is that, after the British, he hated the Transvaalers. The whereabouts of Dewet during the last two or three days is unknown, nor is it known whether President Steyn is with him.

Life Diploma Revoked.

SALEM, Or., March 15.—For the first time in the history of the public schools of Oregon, the State Board of Education today revoked a state life diploma on the ground of immoral conduct. The diploma revoked was that issued to A. B. Macpherson, of Malheur county, in 1898. He was recently charged by Ross Lamberson with habitual drunkenness, gambling and the use of tobacco. The matter was referred to John Howard, of Malheur county, to take testimony of witnesses, and after considering this testimony, the board found the defendant guilty and canceled his diploma. From the testimony it appears that Macpherson has been a resident of Malheur county for many years. There are some evidence in his favor but the preponderance of testimony was clearly against him.

COLUMBIA RIVER TO BE BRIDGED

Railroad to Be Built at Once Down North Bank—To Be Completed in a Year.

PORTLAND, March 14.—In the superior court at Vancouver, Washington, today, Judge Miller decided against the Columbia Valley Railroad Company in the proceedings of the Washington and Oregon railroad to condemn the right of way of the Portland and Puget Sound railroad between Vancouver and the Lewis river. This is part of the grade lying within Clark county. That part between the Lewis river and Kalama is in precisely the same legal situation in Cowlitz county, so the Columbia Valley Company accepted the decision also for that part of the controversy, in order to avoid the necessity of going to Kalama.

There was no appearance on the part of the Portland and Puget Sound Company, and the defeat of the intervention of the Columbia Valley Company left Washington and Oregon people in undisputed possession of the field. The jury awarded the Portland and Puget Sound Company \$11,000 for 1714 miles of right of way.

Manager Price, of the Washington and Oregon Company, said his company expected to begin the construction of the line next week.

He stated that he hoped to have the road finished within a year, including a bridge across the Columbia at Vancouver.

The practical evidence in the northwest of a combination of transcontinental railroad interests is afforded in the harmonious adjustment of the struggle for a track on the north bank of the Columbia between Vancouver and Kalama. This matter has been arranged in New York and there will be no fight.

Government Ownership Impractical.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Thomas F. Clark, vice-president of the Western Union Telegraph Company, testified before the industrial committee concerning the relations of the telegraph company to the public. He devoted much of his time to the consideration of wisdom of government ownership of the telegraph.

"Those who base their advocacy of the system upon its working in Great Britain, Belgium and Switzerland ignore vital differences between the conditions of these countries and the United States," Mr. Clark said. "In this country there are only 67 people to each mile of wire, while there are in Great Britain 130 people to the mile, in Switzerland 220 and in Belgium 321. In the United States there are 1,118,086 miles of wire, and in all of Europe, 1,585,267 miles. "All told, there are 29,000 places in the United States reached by the telegraph companies, while in Great Britain there are only 1186 places thus reached. In this country almost 50 per cent of the postoffices have telegraph connections, while in Great Britain only about one-quarter of them are thus equipped."

While admitting that rates on local messages in Europe are lower than in the United States, Mr. Clark contended that on through messages they are comparatively higher.

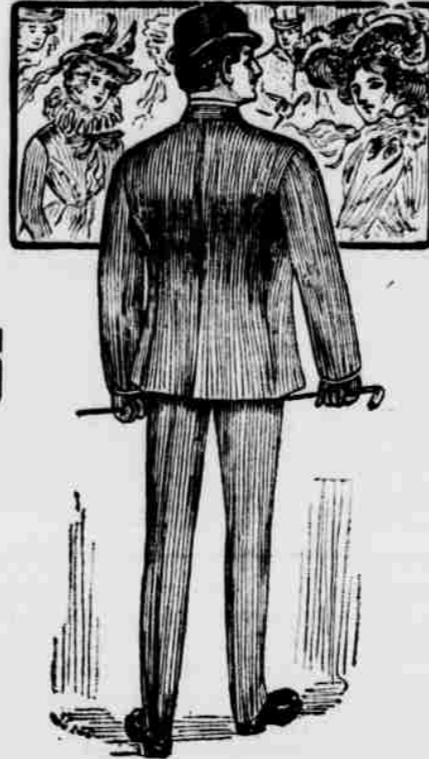
