IRRIGATION IN EASTERN OREGON

Through Mr. Moody's Efforts Eastern Oregon Will Be Viewed the Coming Summer for National Irrigation Plant.

We learn from a Washington dispatch to the Oregonian that Representative Moody has been putting in a good many hours about the departments since the close of congress, looking after matters of interest to Eastern Oregon. As a result he has secured the consent of Professor F. H. Newell, hydrographer of the geological survey, to visit Oregon during the coming summer and, by personal examination, determine just what localities of Eastern Oregon offer the best opportunities for developing the department's plan of irrigation.

It is Mr. Moody's hope to have Mr. Pinchot, the forester of the department of agriculture, visit Eastern Oregon

while Professor Newell is here, that the two may tour this part of the state together, and both get the same idea of conditions among the sheep men. He thinks that by coming in actual contact with the sheepgrowers and rangers, these department officials will appreciate the true conditions better than they can through correspondence, and, at the same time, the stockmen, when they have met and talked with these officials, will learn that there is some good in the rules and methods of the departments, and that these officials are men of practical ideas.

Mr. Pinchot, at the personal solicitation of Mr. Moody, has consented to make this visit to Eastern Oregon, although his planned tour for the summer did not reach so far to the west. He assured Mr. Moody that he anticipated no change in the pasturage policy of the department already adopted on the Cascade reserve. He will make no special investigation in this reserve, since that territory has been thoroughly covered in the past, particularly by Mr. Colville, of the agricultural department, who made a full and comprehensive report upon his return to Washington.

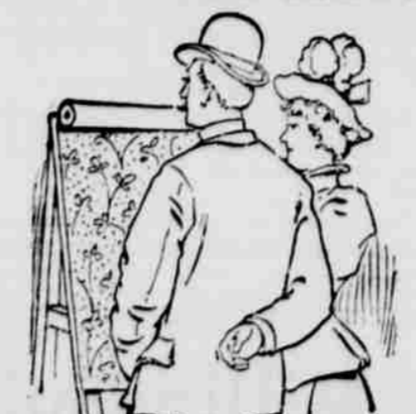
