IRRIGATION IN EASTERN OREGON

Through Mr. Moody's Efforts Eastern Oregon Will Be Viewed the Coming Summer for National Irrigation Plant.

We learn from a Washington dispatch to the Oregonian that Representative Moody has been putting in a good many hours about the departments since the close of congres, looking after matters of interest to Eastern Oregon. As a result he has secured the consent of Professor F. H. Newell, hydrographer of the geological survey, to visit Oregon during the coming summer and, by personal examination, determine just what localities of Eastern Oregon offer the best opportunities for developing the department's plan of irrigation.

It is Mr. Moody's hope to have Mr. Pinchot, the forester of the department of agriculture, visit Eastern Oregon of paint and artist's brusher.


