Presiding Elder Robert Warner will preach at Boyd tomorrow morning and at Dufur in the evening.

The Tygh Valley school, under charge of Professor Aaron Frazier, proposes to give a May day picnic on Friday, May 10th.

C. A. Borders and a force of men completed yesterday the annual cleansing of the reservoir on the Mesple place, on Mill creek.

The funeral of the late Mrs. J. W. Marquis will take place from the Christian church, this city, at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Antelope has adopted a curfew ordinance compelling minors under 16 years to be at their homes after 8 o'clock in summer and after 7 in winter.

Rev. Mr. Lake, of Portland, will hold services at St. Paul's Episcopal church tomorrow morning at 10:30. There will also be a celebration of the holy communion.

The Albany Democrat says that two eastern firms have offered to take the entire issue of the bonds of Independence, Polk county, at four per cent per annum interest.

On account of the death of Miss Davis, Judge A. L. Frazier, of Portland, will take Judge Bradshaw's place at the term of circuit court which opens at Fossil next Monday.

Cards are out announcing the marriage of Miss Alma Schanno, of this city, and Mr. Joseph E. Ditter, of North Yakima, at St. Peter's Catholic church, of this city next Tuesday.

The Glacier learns that a new real estate and brokerage firm will open up for business in Hood River; that A. A. Jayne and M. P. Isenberg will form a partnership for this purpose. They are both competent men in this line, and both have had experience that will be

of great service to them if they open up in Hood River.

A good prospect for coal has been discovered on Warren Wells' place on the hills east of town. It is believed by some that extensive deposits of coal will yet be found in these hills, says the Glacier.

A grand basket entertainment will be given at the Enderby school house on the evening of May 3d, when a fine program will be rendered, the particulars of which will be given in THE CHRONICLE later on.

C. H. Stranahan has sold his Sherman county farm of 530 acres to O. A. Hazen for \$7000, and his stock and farm implements to the same purchaser for \$1000. Mr. Stranahan will move back to the Hood River valley.

Tomorrow Rev. C. D. Nickelsen, who was a former Dalles boy, and is now pastor of the Methodist church at Goldendale, will occupy the pulpit of the Methodist church in this city, both morning and evening.

Mrs. Mary Pickett has filed a complaint in the circuit court asking a divorce from her husband, Frank Pickett, on the ground of desertion. These parties were married September 16, 1898, and have no children. Mrs. Pickett alleges that her husband deserted her in October, 1899. W. H. Wilson is attorney for the plaintiff.

The first Portland-Dalles excursion of the season 1901 will be given by the Past Sachers' Association on Sunday, May 12th. A special committee of the association was here from Portland yesterday soliciting subscriptions for the excursion. They report having met with gratifying success.

James Hunt, secretary of the Heppner fire department, writes to E. M. Wingate, secretary of the board of delegates of the Dalles fire department, that the Heppner boys are making preparation for the next annual state tournament to be held at that place and that \$1200 has already been subscribed for prizes. The Heppner people have gained an enviable reputation as entertainers and all who will participate in the tournament are assured of a good time. The communication will be laid before the several Dalles fire companies for their action.

Hood River had a "strike" one day last week, which for some reason unexplained was not reported in the daily papers, says the Glacier. Three boys, one of them getting \$1.25 a day and the others \$1 each, notified the manager of the box factory that they must have a raise of two bits a day each on their wages. Next morning the three lined up at the door, and when the boss arrived, asked him what he was going to do about it. He said he would do nothing unless it was to fire them. The boys stayed out, but as there was a dozen other young fellows awaiting their jobs, there was no suspension of work in the box factory.

To Investigate Poisonous Weeds.

E. V. Chestnut, of the United States agricultural department at Washington, and one of the most eminent botanists in America, and Professor E. R. Lake, of the Oregon Agricultural College, arrived here night before last and left yesterday on a trip through the region south of here for the purpose of making an investigation of the poisonous grasses and weeds that are responsible for the death of many sheep and cattle annually. Much interest attaches to this government investigation, and the results will doubtless be of inestimable value, as it will enable them to recognize poisonous vegetations and govern the grazing of their herds accordingly. As an authority upon grasses Professor Chestnut stands pre-eminent, and his services are always in demand. Last year he conducted investigations in Montana, and in consequence of them Montana sheepmen report the loss of
