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## RULING ON GAME LAW

Trout Can't Be Brought Here Out of Season—Important Decision by Judge Bellinger, Federal Court.

Game brought into the state of Oregon is amenable to the laws of the state, and although trout may have been legally caught in the state of Washington, they cannot be brought into Oregon and sold in the open market when the season is closed. That was the gist of a decision rendered this morning by Judge Bellinger in the Federal court, and is of importance, because by its terms the state has entire control over all fish brought within its borders.

The case was brought into court on a writ of habeas corpus sued out by W. W. Deininger, manager of the Chloopeck Fish Company, who was arrested and fined \$35 for selling in the open markets of Portland trout which were caught in Washington. The contention of the defense was that the trout having been lawfully caught, it would be interfering with interstate commerce to restrain their sale here.

Judge Bellinger quoted from a Connecticut decision, in which it was held that the state could make and enforce such laws. "The decision is based on the fundamental principle," said Judge Bellinger, "of the complete ownership of many things, such as real estate, and the qualified ownership of birds and fish. There is no rule by which we can distinguish between bringing game into the state or taking it out. The ultimate object sought in this case is the sale of the fish, and the law has a legitimate right to stop this. The taking of fish is not an industry. The right of Oregon to prohibit the selling of game at certain times does not depend upon the laws of another state. When the game is brought here from another state it becomes the game of this state, and is under the authority of the officers. The petition for a writ of habeas corpus will therefore be denied."

Why the Queen Hated Gladstone.  
New York, April 17.—The Quarterly Review, according to the London corre-

spondent of the Tribune, contains a remarkable article on Queen Victoria, evidently written from a precise and intimate knowledge during a period of 50 years. The article is not signed, but it is perhaps the first character study of the queen made by any competent writer who had the advantage of personal acquaintance with her. It throws a new light upon the many secret passages in the history of the reign, and contains a series of fresh anecdotes illustrating the queen's characteristic traits of trenchant humor and racy talk.

The explanation given of the queen's prejudice against Mr. Gladstone is that it started in the suspicion that he gave her too much work to do, until she was as she put it, "dead beat." He tried in his eagerness to press her to do what she considered to be his work, and when she resented it, and he renewed the attempt, she formed a pertinacious prejudice against him which never was removed. The author stated that it was always an element in her reticence with regard to Mr. Gladstone that he was too high church and had the mind of a Jesuit.

The queen's own attitude toward religion is discussed judiciously. The headship of the Anglican church, or the Scotch Presbyterianism, she considered to be a part of the business of statecraft, and did not trouble her conscience about it. Probably the form of service which she preferred was that of the Presbyterian church, but she was a broad church woman, with no curiosity about creeds. She liked Roman Catholics much better than Anglican Ritualists.

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### Will Make Test Case.

SALEM, April 17.—E. E. Nichols, who opened a cigar store in this city Monday, was yesterday afternoon arrested by Sheriff F. W. Darr in for running a nickel-in-the-slot machine, and was held for trial by City Recorder N. J. Judah. Nichols opened his store on Saturday and announced that he would run a slot machine by giving a five-cent cigar for every nickel dropped into the device, in addition to the regular prizes. He did a large business from the start, and the arrest followed.

It is generally understood this is to be a test case, and that all the cigar-dealers and saloon men are backing Nichols in the venture, and that it will go to the supreme court for the purpose of securing a decision of that tribunal on the constitutionality of the Proebstel nickel-in-the-slot-machine bill. The outcome is awaited with interest.

### Bad For the Trust.

SALEM, April 17.—Governor T. T. Geer has at offer of a 30-acre tract of timber from a resident in the Cascade range, along the C. & E. railroad, who is anxious for the state to cut the timber for wood for the several institutions. As the state has no available men for this work, the governor has suggested to the owner that he hire his own labor, cut the wood, and sell it to the state, he being assured of a liberal contract. It is likely that a deal will be made whereby the wood for the asylum will be secured in this way. Another timber man from nearer this city has made a similar offer, and he is now looking for men to cut his wood, as he is desirous of selling 5000 or 6000 cords, at a low figure, to the state. By this means the so-called wood trust will find itself in serious difficulty, being left with a large stock of wood on hand, and some of it is said to be of a low grade, being worked up from dead trees, partially decayed, and not the best quality for fuel.
