## IS STILL A MYSTERY

No Light On Failure of the Vancouver Bank—The Body of President Brown Was Laid at Rest Yesterday.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 22.—There were no new developments today concerning the failure of the First National Bank, and the sensational double suicide that occurred in connection therewith. Bank Examiner Maxwell, who is acting as temporary receiver, has as yet nothing to give out in connection with the failure and the cause of it is still shrouded in mystery.

The bodies of the dead president and cashier were removed to their respective homes last night after dark. The grief of the families of the deceased officials is pitiful in the extreme. While enough of the condition of the bank has leaked out to satisfy the depositors that the wrecking of the bank was deliberately planned and systematically carried out, still no suspicion attaches that the families of the deceased officers knew anything concerning it, and the double shock of the startling disclosures attending the failure, and the subsequent announcement of the remarkable suicide fell with crushing force upon them.

Brown's wife and daughter, the latter being Mrs. Harriet Brown Carpenter, were both ill at the time. S. W. Brown, the aged father of the deceased president of the bank, is said to be in a dying condition as a result of the terrible happening. He is 82 years of age.

It is now certain that neither official went home after leaving the bank Friday evening. It is also practically proven that the fatal shots, which ended the lives of both, were fired Friday evening about 7:30 o'clock. No man has yet been found who saw either man after they left the bank at 6 o'clock, one hour and a half before they are supposed to have killed themselves.

It was given out today by members of the Brown family, that Brown also left a dying message to his wife, which was found on his person. It was scribbled a leaf of a small memorandum book. This book is in the possession of the family, and could not be seen.

The committee of prominent citizens who requested Levi Ankeny, the Walla Walla banker, to reorganize the wrecked bank, are as yet unable to report results. Mr. Ankeny is favorable to the project, but can do nothing until the investigations of the controller of the currency

reach that stage that he can make a statement of the bank's condition.

### Sneak Over Border.

NEW YORK, April 22.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Taylor will appoint in a few days an immigration inspector and assign him to the special duty of making an investigation of the fraudulent admission of immigrants into the United States.

Steamship lines at New York have found recently that their steamers have brought comparatively few immigrants to the United States, and inquiry developed that persons desirous of avoiding inspection went to Canada and then tried to enter the states over the border. New York has received many of this class.

Mexico has again served as a base for the entrance of Chinese into this country. A report received at the treasury department shows that 2000 Chinamen were taken to Mexico and employed on the Mexican Central railroad. Fifteen hundred of these men quickly crossed the border, and all except 300, who were arrested and deported, are now under the American flag. Investigation of the situation on the Mexican border is in progress.

### Case of Tolstoi.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 8.—A letter from Countess Sophia Tolstoi to Monsignore Antoni, Metropolitan of St. Petersburg, and the Metropolitan's answer, are published in the official Ecclesiastical Messenger. After declaring her unalterable determination to die in the orthodox church, the countess castigates Monsignore Antoni and the Holy Synod for the secret circular to the clergy forbidding the Count Tolstoi's burial with the rites of the church. The expression, "apiritual hangman," seasons the countess' charge that the servants of the church have rejected the law of love for world power and pride. She concludes by anticipating a hypocritical refutation of her position.

The Metropolitan's answer not illogically contends that Count Tolstoi first disassociated himself from the orthodox faith and that the Holy Synod merely took note of his heterodoxy. Monsignore Antoni says:

"You are receiving expressions of sympathy from the whole world, but I do not believe that they will comfort you. There is a human and a divine glory."
