BOLOMEN SURRENDER

The Insurgents of South Ilocos Lay Down Their Arms—Number is 115 Officers and 2157 Men.

MANILA, April 24.—One hundred and fifteen officers and 2157 bolomen have surrendered and sworn allegiance to the United States at Narvacan, province of South Ilocos.

The Americans are active throughout the archipelago, accelerating surrenders.

Major Noble, adjutant-general of the department of the Visayas, has received the surrender of Quentin Salas and three of his officers. All the insurgents under Salas will surrender soon. It is claimed this will terminate the insurrection.

It is estimated that there are 25,000 lepers in the Philippines and it is planned to isolate them all from the island. Major Maus, the medical inspector, Captain Abern, of the Ninth Infantry, and Captain Horton, comprising a board of officers appointed to select a suitable place for the purpose, have visited Busanga, Cullion, Cogayan, DeJolo and other islands and have made a report, but it has not yet been acted on.

The commissary investigation is progressing. Several important witnesses in the Reed case have left Manila. Barry Baldwin, Thomas Harris, Fred Macondry and H. Schindler, prominent merchants, who are supposed to possess information concerning money paid to commissary officers, are detained as witnesses under \$2500 bail. Other arrests will be made. The trial of Captain James C. Reed, arrested on the charge of participating in the commissary frauds, has been temporarily postponed.

Japan's Monument to Perry.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The navy department has received a letter from Admiral Remy, in command of the Asiatic station, making known his purpose to be present at the ceremony attending the erection of a monument to Commodore Perry at Kuribama, Japan, July 14th. The ceremony has something of an international aspect, as is indicative of the kindly sentiments existing between Japan and the United States. As to his plan for the trip Admiral Remy writes:

"Believing it to be for the best interests of the United States to be well represented on that occasion, it is my intention to attend the ceremonies with

the Brooklyn and such other vessels as conditions at that time may enable me to take in company, starting from Che Foo and making this fit in as part of the squadron drill and cruising, which I have planned for this summer."

STEVENSON, Wash., April 23.—Skamania county has \$10,000 in the First National bank at Vancouver, which has been closed by Examiner Maxwell. The officials of the bank were the bondsmen of the county treasurer, and had had been accepted by the county commissioners. If the county should lose these funds the loss will be the most serious in its history, and one from which it will not soon recover.

EPIDEMIC OF THE SMALLPOX

Between 200 and 300 Cases Exist in Snohomish County, and no Quarantine is Maintained.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 24.—A very serious epidemic of smallpox is prevalent within the borders of Snohomish county, lying north of King, between 200 and 300 cases existing there at present, without even quarantine restrictions. The King county commissioners have applied to Governor Rogers to establish a forcible quarantine. Commissioner E. P. Smith reports that the epidemic is spreading rapidly, and unless checked will extend to every portion of the state and the Pacific Coast. The facts have been kept quiet by Snohomish county officials, but Commissioner Smith reports a startling state of affairs, showing the greatest negligence. He says:

"No efforts has been made by the county officials to check the disease; no quarantine on diseased persons even was established. In each of the towns of Wallace, Sultan and Monroe there exist between 50 and 75 cases. Nothing is done to prevent the patients coming in contact with others. The epidemic is spreading rapidly, and something must be done at once. Every day or two some patient escapes from pesthouses at Warren and Irving. The case has become so serious that guards are compelled to fire at the fleeing men, and then it is impossible to prevent them from getting away. The proposed quarantine will necessitate the employment of several hundred guards to watch every road and avenue of escape from the county's borders.

CHICAGO, April 24.—The Tribune says: German singing societies in Chicago are greatly interested in the announcement of the emperor of Germany that he will distribute prizes to the value of 30,000 marks this year to encourage the singing of German folk songs. Last year the German singing societies of this country competed for a prize offered by the emperor. The competition was held in Brooklyn, and was won by a Brooklyn society.

It is presumed that the recent offer of Emperor William will include a prize for Americans as well as a prize to be competed for at some place in Germany by societies from all over the world.

"It is understood that the prizes offered by the emperor will be known as the Kaiser prizes, and that one will be offered to the societies in the United States," said Harry S. Rubens. "The German emperor is deeply interested in the encouragement of the singing of folk songs, and takes this method of arousing interest."
