WAYSIDE GLEANINGS.

"The Henrietta"
At the Vogt tonight.

J. C. Trullinger, father of Mrs. T. T. Geer, is very ill at his home in Astoria and not expected to live. Mr. Trullinger is in his 73d year.

John P. Coileary, an old and respected farmer of Klickitat county, died at his home in Pleasant Valley on the 20th instant, aged 65 years.

Six hundred yards of Jap. silk will be put on sale at Pease & Mays' Saturday morning at 25 cents per yard. The assortment covers twelve of the best colors.

Robert Snodgrass, late of Boyd, has bought the McHealey residence, a short distance east of the top of the brewery hill, and will make it his future home.

The masons have finished the foundation of the Wasco Warehouse new flouring mill, and the contract for the construction of the mill building will be let in a few days.

O. W. Johnson, who was tried in Justice Brownhill's court Wednesday for assaulting Perry Wing in an East End saloon, was sentenced yesterday afternoon to a fine of \$25, which he paid.

The river at 8 o'clock this morning stood 12.7 feet above low water mark. One year ago today it stood 19 feet and two years ago 14.1. It has risen 2.4 feet during the past week, rather a remarkable rise for so cool weather.

The store of H. L. Price, successor to C. F. Stephens, which has been closed yesterday and today on account of the death of Mr. Price's mother will open again tomorrow morning. Mrs. Price's funeral took place today at Portland.

Mr. Will H. Anders, of Olympia, is visiting with Mr. Levin. Mr. Anders came down to play Bertie in "The Henrietta," should Mr. Evans not be in the city. Mr. Evans, however, did not

have to go away and will be seen in the role tonight.

The Glacier thinks it is rather hard on Hood River to have to give in property valuations to a deputy assessor who last year was the census enumerator. "Last year we were rich, with everything coming our way; this year we are too poor to pay taxes."

The Shaniko Leader says: "C. L. Andersen, who was employed by the Shaniko Townsite Company last year, is now in the employ of Sexton & Walter of The Dalles. That firm is very fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Andersen, as no better plumber or hardware man is in the state."

H. E. Blocher came to Hood River with his family six years ago. Arriving here his worldly goods amounted to \$4.50 in cash. He engaged in strawberry growing and bought forty acres on time for \$3,000. Two months ago he sold ten acres for 1,000, and on Monday the balance for \$4,000.—Glacier.

A very interesting program has been prepared for the temperance meeting tonight at the Methodist church, and a large crowd should be in attendance. Special music by the male quartet and short speeches by the pastors of the various churches will be features of the meeting. Lend your presence and enjoy the service.

A marriage license was issued yesterday afternoon to John Frates and Sallie Head. The couple are both residents of The Dalles. The bridegroom came here some seven months ago from Sherman county, where he had been engaged in the sheep business. The wedding was held at the European House last night, and the wedding ceremony was performed by Rev. W. Brenner, pastor of the Lutheran church.

A sheepman who dislikes to have his name in print told THE CHRONICLE this morning that his increase from a band of 800 ewes, 175 of which were barren, is 803 lambs. The lambing took place in a high altitude when the weather was intensely cold for the season and where shelter from cold winds was impossible. As a result "quite a lot" of the lambs were lost, yet the net increase from the pregnant ewes is over 117 per cent.

This year seems to be a phenomenal one for large yields of lambs. W. H. Crawford, of North Dalles, yesterday counted the increase of lambs from a flock of 900 ewes and found it to be 120 per cent. That is to say, from the entire flock of 900 ewes, including an uncounted percentage of barren ones, he marked 1080 lambs. It is only fair to add that

in their entrance into the world the lambs were peculiarly favored as to both time and place, and as a result the loss was not worth mentioning.

A boy of 16 years named Zimmerman was arrested last night by Nightwatchmen Champlin and locked up in the calaboose on the charge of having committed an assault upon a Chinaman. The boy was released later when \$10 had been put up for him to secure his appearance in the event of a complaint being made against him by the Chinaman. The Chinaman charges that young Zimmerman hit him on the back of the head with a rock, and backs up his statement by exhibiting an ugly wound at the base of the skull. He was trying all of this afternoon to find some one who had witnessed the assault, but had not succeeded in time for this report. THE CHRONICLE knows nothing of this case farther than is here related; but it does know that it is a matter of common complaint that boys of 8 to 16 years, and girls too, are allowed by their parents to wander the streets at unreasonable hours, and it is no wise strange that they should get into mischief. If this boy is guilty of assaulting an unoffending Chinaman, the authorities will be derelict in their duty if they do not make an example of him.
