SERMON ON THE GAMBLING EVIL

Dr. Hillis Declares It is the Greatest of All—Insane Desire to Grow Rich Quickly Prevades All Classes, He Says.

New York, May 13.—"The Evils of Gambling and the Perils of Making Haste to Be Rich" was the subject of Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis' sermon last night at Plymouth church, Brooklyn. Dr. Hillis said:

"The evils of drink are familiar to you. There are other evils. But the greatest peril is the insane spirit of gambling, which seems to have taken hold of the people, irrespective of social standing or religious belief. The insane desire to get rich quickly is at the bottom of it all. There is no difference between the newsboy who flips coins and the man in Wall Street who buys stocks on margins on a chance that they will rise or fall. Both wish to get something for nothing; both are gamblers.

"The incessant gambling on all sports has wrought intellectual demoralization to the country. Horse racing is one of the noblest of sports, but it has been degraded and bestialized by gambling. Every Saturday afternoon you see at the race tracks thousands of working girls and men who have families to support, crazy with the intoxication of gambling. As each race is run they stand up, a yelling cursing, purple-faced, brutalized gang.

"From the tiny lad selling newspapers on the street, to men dwelling in a palace, the gambling spirit seems to have invaded all. Where is this thing going to end? Is it time we called a halt and began to consider what things are really worth while?"

Annual services of the church association for the advancement of the interests of labor were held last night in Holy Trinity church. The Rev. Dr. J. P. Peters, rector of St. Michael's Episcopal church, preached.

"The committee of 15," he said, will make a raid and the gambler who is arrested doesn't want his name to get into the papers. But there are gamblers in Wall Street who biazon their names prominently over their doors and are glad to tell you of their winnings or losses.

"We have an exhibition of what harm one man with great wealth can do. No man has the right to manipulate such a deal as was executed in Wall Street. Each of us owes a duty to our fellow-men, and the man who so far forgets this duty as to permit himself to become engaged in transactions of such a kind and magnitude is utterly lost to principle."

She Was Not Fast Enough.

LONDON, May 13.—3:22 p. m.—Shamrock I today beat Sir Thomas Lipton's new boat by five minutes and five seconds over a triangular course of about twenty miles. The only possible disadvantage to the challenger was in the fact that she used her old mainsail which sits worse since its salt water bath of Thursday. There was no discoverable holding back of the challenger, although once or twice she pointed such a course as left the suspicion that the steersman was not taking advantage of every chance.

There is no doubt that the result of today's trial was distinctly disappointing to those who had pinned their faith to the new challenger, especially as Shamrock I on the previous spins has not shown equal quality with the new racer on any point of sailing with the exception of running.

The weather conditions all favored a fair trial with the wind fresh and steady, the course clear of all obstructions and no tides of any consequence.

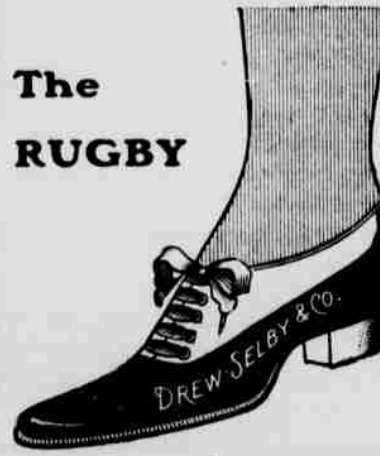

TRIP TO PORTLAND MAY BE ABANDONED

Presidential Party Will Probably Omit Tour to the Northwest—Mrs. McKinley is Better This Morning.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13.—Secretary Cortelyou this morning gave out the following bulletin as to Mrs. McKinley's condition:

"Mrs. McKinley rested well during the night and this morning was quite comfortable, as her physicians expected her to be."

President McKinley will not decide until later in the day whether he will go to San Jose or not.

There is some probability of President McKinley abandoning his proposed trip to Portland and the Northwest in view of the condition of Mrs. McKinley. Unless there is a radical change for the better the presidential party will leave for Washington soon after the celebrations in this section are over.

Mr. McKinley is very much worried over the condition of his wife, and it is even possible that many of the functions arranged in his honor for this week may be postponed or dropped altogether.

Secretary Cortelyou has given notice that Mrs. McKinley should she continue the trip with the president will not under any circumstances engage in any of the social functions arranged for the party at any place, but that she will remain as quiet as possible during the remainder of the tour.

As Desired by McKinley.

SALEM, May 13.—It has been decided, and was announced today, that neither the legislative committee nor Governor Geer will go to the state line to meet President McKinley and his party. This action has been taken in compliance with the wishes of President McKinley, expressed through his private secretary. It is the president's desire to have the reception take place at the capital of the state, thus saving the time and confusion of a double reception. It has been the custom during the present tour for the president to be met by committees at the cities they represent, and it is thought appropriate that the committee representing the whole state should receive the president at the capital.

Sealed bids will be received by the board of portage commissioners of the State of Oregon until 2 o'clock p. m. May 24, 1901, and then publicly opened, for the purchase of a tract of land east boundary line of the United States Government Reserve ninety-eight and four-tenths (98.4) feet north of the southeast corner thereof, thence northeasterly paralleling the track of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company eleven hundred (1100) feet, being a strip eleven hundred (1100) feet long between the track of the railroad company and the Columbia river, as fully described at page 101 Book "F," Records of Deeds for Wasco County, Oregon, authority for said sale being granted by an act of the twenty-first legislative assembly, conveyance to be a bargain and sale deed.
