**PRESBYTERIANS HAVE AGREED**

Confession of Faith Question Goes to Committee—It is to Submit to Next Assembly a Brief Statement of the Reformed Faith.

PHILADELPHIA, May 27.—By a unanimous vote the Presbyterian General Assembly today adopted the report of the special committee on the revision of the confession of faith. The debate on the important question had extended into the fourth day, and to Rev. Dr. James D. Moffat is due the credit of having brought the commissioners of such a harmonious conclusion. When recommendation B was, on Sunday, adopted by a comparatively small majority, Dr. Moffat announced that, in view of the divergency of opinion, he would today offer an amendment which he hoped would meet the approval of the entire assembly. The amendment follows: "We recommend that this committee be instructed to prepare and submit to the next general assembly, for each disposition as may be judged to be wise, a brief statement of the reformed faith, expressed as far as possible in untechnical terms. The said statement is to be prepared with a view of its being employed to give information and a better understanding of our doctrinal beliefs, and not with a view to its becoming a substitute for or an alternative of our confession of faith."

When he presented the amendment today, it was instantly accepted by the commissioners, and the adoption of the report as a whole followed with little delay.

Dr. Niccolis, of St. Louis, a leader of the minority party, in a brief speech, heartily seconded the amendment, which action drew forth considerable applause. As commissioners who represented all shades of opinion in the assembly rose to speak for the amendment, applause swept over the vast assemblage. A viva voce vote was taken, and when 640 ayes responded to the question, the commissioners sang "Praise God, From Whom All Blessings Flow," which was followed by a prayer of thanksgiving by Moderator Minton.

**Celebrated His Release.**  
NEW YORK, May 26.—The release on bail of J. Luther Pierson, the convicted faith curist, of Kenosha, was celebrated today by a reunion of several Dowie followers at the "Overlook," the Pierson home. It was reported at Kenosha today that the Piersons intend to move away from that village on account of the notoriety they have gained. On the front door of the Pierson residence are two signs that give credence to this report. Mr. Pierson in discussing his future plans with John Pine, warden at the Plains jail, said:

"I expect to go back to my desk in the accounting department of the New York Central Railroad on Monday."  
"What do you think?" he was asked, "of the arrest of Rev. John Alexander Dowie?"  
"It's too bad. It's a sad blow to him. But he is justified in carrying on his work. He will not be prosecuted. God will protect him."

**Two New Banks in Grant's Pass.**  
GRANT'S PASS, May 27.—The foundation stones of two new bank buildings for Grant's Pass have just been laid. Heretofore the First National bank has transacted all the banking business of the county, but by the close of summer three will be doing business here. One of the new buildings started today will be occupied by the Grant's Pass Banking and Trust Co. The other is being built by J. P. Tufts, W. H. Freed, contractor, and will be one of the finest structures in the city when completed. The First National Bank will transact a general banking business in this building.

**Take Final Vote Today.**  
HAVANA, May 27.—By unanimous agreement, the Cuban Constitutional Convention has decided to take a final vote on the acceptance of the Platt amendment tomorrow. The conservatives assert that the Platt amendment will be accepted by a vote of 17 to 11.

**THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICY SUSTAINED**

United States Supreme Court Hands Down Sweeping Decision in the Insular Cases—Congress May Govern Dependence.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The United States supreme court today handed down opinions covering all the issues on the new insular possessions, which have been in controversy. Although several of the decisions uphold the contestants on certain issues raised, yet in the most important decision, that of Downes against Bidwell, Justice Brown announced the sweeping decision of the court upholding the general attitude and policy of the government up to the present time. The effect of this decision is to affirm the constitutionality of the Foraker act, and to give congress power to deal with a new acquired territory in such manner as the legislative branch may consider suitable for the new territory. The decision also has the effect of declaring that the new insular possessions do not by virtue of cession acquire all the privileges and rights of the constitution.

**Sampson to Retire.**  
NEW YORK, May 27.—According to a Washington dispatch to the World it is reported in naval circles at the capital that Rear-Admiral Sampson may ask for voluntary retirement on account of his health, and that the navy department will grant his request. He will not regularly be retired under the statutory clause until late next winter.

Rear-Admiral Sampson is now commandant at the Boston Navy-Yard. He has served more than thirty-five years, and is entitled to retirement upon application. His friends say he has nothing to gain by remaining longer in the service for he has reached the highest grade possible now.

No official application has been received at Washington from him and he may make none until after Secretary Long's return.
