## ACCEPTED BY ONE MAJORITY

Cuban Convention Accepted the Platt Amendment—Radicals Made a Hard Fight.

HAVANA, May 28.—The Platt amendment was accepted by the Cuban constitutional convention today by a vote of 15 to 14. The actual vote was on accepting the majority report of the committee on relations which embodied the amendment, with explanations or certain clauses.

The radicals made a hard fight at the last moment and Senors Portuondo, Gomez and Tamayo bitterly arraigned the conservatives. Senor Tamayo was particularly vindictive and declared that everybody who voted in favor of the Platt amendment was a traitor to his country. The convention compelled him to retract this statement. On several occasions personal encounters seemed imminent.

Senor Gomez spoke for more than an hour, and his speech undoubtedly won over Senors Castro, Robau and Manduley. He appealed to the patriotism of delegates, and rehearsed the long fight for independence, denouncing as perjurers all who favored the Platt amendment on the ground that they had sworn to draw up a constitution for an independent republic. Several conservatives arose and asked Senor Gomez to retract, but he absolutely refused.

The following delegates voted against the majority report: Gomez, Gener, Portuondo, Lacro, Manduley, Cisneros, Feror, Fortun, Robau, E. Tamayo, Silva, Castro, Zayas and Aleman. Senors Rivera and Bravo were absent.

The convention will continue its sessions, which will be devoted to discussions upon the election law.

### Restraint of Dowry.

CHICAGO, May 27.—That Zion Home is a hospital within the meaning of the law is the purport of an opinion submitted today by George H. Kriete, attorney for the health department. Acting thereon C. W. Reynolds forwarded to John Alexander Dowie one of the regular application blanks for a hospital license. If the "doctor" signs the application Dowie puts himself under the authority of the city and must abide by the regulations of the health department. If he ignores, he will have the law to deal with, for the ordinance provides penalties of \$100 for a first conviction, and more on subsequent occasions for those running hospitals without a license.

Another death of a Zionist occurred last evening, this time at the residence of Deaconess Bratsch, one of the women held in the case of Mrs. Judd. The name of the victim is Thomas Steele. He came here several months ago, suffering from consumption, and applied for admission to Zion Home last week. The police department is investigating his death, and inquiring into the circumstances under which a certificate was issued by a doctor.

### Tillman's Manifesto.

COLUMBIA, S. C., May 28.—Senator Tillman gave out a long statement today, addressed to the people of South Carolina, in explanation of his action in resigning. Senator Tillman reviews his political career in South Carolina, goes over recent political events in which Senator McLaurin has figured, and declares that McLaurin attacked him in Charlotte, Greenville and Gaffney. McLaurin, Tillman says, was making a canvass of the state unopposed, and he stepped in. McLaurin, he declares, is supplied with unlimited money. He does not think the campaign will be too hard for the benefits to be derived.

### Found in Favor of Rosecrans.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The secretary of war has approved the findings of the board, of which Major-General Brooke was chairman, appointed to investigate the claim of Major William F. Smith, United States army, retired, that he, and not General Rosecrans, conceived the plan for the relief of Chattanooga by military operations to be conducted in Lookout Valley in October, 1863. The board found that General Rosecrans devised the plan.

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### VICTORY FOR EXPANSION

Policy of McKinley Administration Splendidly Vindicated.

NEW YORK, May 28.—Former Attorney-General Griggs, in an interview on the supreme court Porto Rico decisions, said:  
"It is a splendid victory for the administration on the vital principle of expansion. It is unnecessary for me to say that I am thoroughly satisfied with the result. It is a clear-cut victory for the government on the only really important point involved.  
"Three distinct classes of action were involved; one protesting against the collecting of tariffs upon imports, from Porto Rico after the date of our armed occupancy of the island and before the date of the ratification of the treaty of peace; another protesting against tariff charges on imports between the ratification and the passage of the Foraker act, and a third attacking the Foraker law as unconstitutional.  
"The decision scores a victory for the administration in the first of these classes and upon the all-important third. The anti-administration party wins in the second class. That triumph is a mere matter of dollars and cents. Importers will get back the money paid in tariff between the ratification and the passage of the Foraker act. Importers who paid without protesting will not get their money back.  
"The court decides that the Foraker act is constitutional, that this country has the legal right to govern its new possessions as territories, to make special laws for them and to tax their products. This has been the contention of the administration from the very start. It was the principal issue in the last campaign for president. Our Porto Rican legislation was selected by Mr. Bryan as the main point of attack in his Indianapolis speech. The decision puts a quietus upon that sort of thing and takes the matter out of politics for all time.  
"This decision is final. There can be no appeal. The decision will not hurt Porto Rican trade in the least."
