OIL STRIKE IS GENUINE

Only Question is Extent of Discovery Near Olympia—Oil is So Thick That it Can Be Dipped Up With a Spoon.

OLYMPIA, May 30.—The Oregonian correspondent today visited the scene of Tuesday's oil strike in Thurston county, about twelve miles from here, and made an investigation of the merits of the finds. None of the statements of those who made the strike, and heretofore published, appears to be greatly exaggerated. The amount of oil in the well is somewhat problematical, but there is no question that oil has been struck. Today two workmen were engaged in an endeavor to empty the water and clay from the well, and each time the bailer, which holds about 10 gallons, came to the surface it contained oil. As the bailer was emptied on a side hill the oil could be seen on the surface of the water, and could be removed with a spoon. The oil is, of course, crude. Experts say when it is refined it will be worth at least \$2 a barrel as a lubricating oil. The crude petroleum in the well is seepage from the oil formation at a depth of 198 feet.

Boring was resumed this afternoon, and the experts employed by the oil company are confident that within a week a flowing well, or even a gusher, will be developed. There does not appear to be any reason to believe that any sharp practice has prevailed, as it would be next to impossible to "salt" a well so that it would show up as does this new find.

Would End in Failure.

LONDON, May 30.—Commenting editorially this morning on the agitation in Germany and Austria for a combination against American commercial competition, the Times says:

"The sole hope for Pan-Europe, according to these writers, is to imitate Napoleon and introduce the continental system against the United States. It must be owned that the precedent is rather disheartening. If the continental system failed in Napoleon's iron grasp, it would hardly succeed in the hands of our old friend, the concert of Europe."

"With the markets of Great Britain and her colonies remaining open, the suggested wealth boycott against America does not wear a hopeful aspect. The scheme is preposterous and impracticable on the face of it, but the editorial articles which propose it deserve attention as the revelation of the acute, continued jealousy and fear of American greatness and prosperity which prevail in certain quarters of the continent."

Large Beef Sale.


BAKER CITY, May 30.—A large sale of beef will be consummated in Malheur county June 10th. That is the date fixed for the delivery to one single Eastern firm of between 10,000 and 12,000 head of yearlings and 2-year-olds. All of this stock is intended for the Eastern market, and will not be driven to the Montana or Wyoming range for fattening. It is in condition at the present time. Yearlings are purchased by these buyers for \$20, and 2-year-olds for \$27. This price is one dollar cheaper than the same stock sold for at the same period last year. The sale will clean up most of the surplus beef in that section of the country, and will leave but few from the immediate district for the fall market. Buyers are quite active in Malheur and Harney counties, and offer tempting prices.

WOOL MARKET IS YET DULL

Aggregate of Business Is Less Than in Preceding Week.

BOSTON, May 29.—The American Wool and Cotton Reporter will say tomorrow: There is as yet no increase to be noted in the amount of business in the wool market. In fact, the market has ruled quieter the past week than during the previous week, and we figure the sales at only 2,290,000 pounds, against 3,527,000 pounds a week ago. Some of the large mills are reported in the market, but with only one exception they have taken very small quantities of wool.

The trend of the goods market is partly toward an improvement, but the clothing trade is still buying goods in a conservative way, which is reflected in a very quiet demand for wool. Prices continue in favor of the buyer, except on fine wools, which are firmly held in view of the strength shown in the country, and the relative firmness of fine stock at the London sales. The excitement in the West has abated. Two of the largest dealers in the market have bought no wools in the West, believing that the prices which have been paid there are not warranted. Not only 25,000,000 pounds of new wools thus far this year have been bought out there, and conservative dealers are of the opinion that new wools can be bought at more favorable prices later on—at any rate, they are willing to take their chances of securing wools later at as favorable terms as are now quoted.

Sales for the week at Boston amounted to 2,135,000 pounds domestic and 155,000 pounds foreign, making a total of 2,290,000 pounds, against a total of 1,150,000 pounds for the corresponding period last year. The sales since January 1st amount to \$1,127,900 pounds, against \$1,466,900 pounds for the corresponding time last year.

Drowned in the John Day.
ARLINGTON, Or., May 29.—Byron Sanders, aged about 19 years, was drowned in the John Day river near Croy yesterday forenoon. Sanders and a younger brother were endeavoring to ford the river on horseback. When

about half way across they discovered that the stream was too high to cross safely, and turned about and endeavored to regain the shore. The younger brother of the dead man was in advance, and he says that upon looking back he noticed that his brother's horse was unmanageable, and that the rider either fell or was thrown from the horse into the water. The unfortunate man was a good swimmer and struck out boldly for the shore, which he reached within a short time. The current, however, had carried him below a safe landing place, the banks of the river at the point reached by him being entirely too precipitous for ascent. He then endeavored to effect a landing below, but was drawn into a whirlpool and sank from sight. The body has not been recovered, although a search has been going on since the accident. Hon. J. E. David, of Croy, brought the news of the accident to Arlington this evening.

With his parents Sanders had resided on the John Day river for a number of years, and was well known in Sherman and Gilliam counties.
