MINERS FAVOR A NEW LABOR PARTY

Action of Western Labor Union Endorsed at Denver—Are Opposed to Expansion.

DENVER, June 3.—The Western Federation of Miners very nearly completed the work of the present session today and are expected to adjourn finally tomorrow. The resolutions adopted last week by the Western Labor Union in favor of a new labor party, were adopted unanimously. The resolutions committee made its report, which was adopted.

The preamble of the resolutions contains the following paragraphs:

"We advise the toiler to be ever on the alert in defense of his right, educate himself to protect those rights by a peaceful use of the ballot, so long as feasible such means will justify the end in view. When not, let us be prepared to meet the enemy with weapons of his choice, and rather spill every drop of life-saving fluid at the point of the bayonet than submit to further oppression on the part of our aggressors."

"We are opposed to the expansion of our national boundaries for the acquisition of territory populated other than by the Circassian race.

"We view with alarm the evident desire to increase the standing army. Therefore we express the hope that members of organized labor everywhere will refrain from voluntary enlistment in any department of the federal or state military service.

British Completely Surprised by Boers.

LONDON, June 4.—Lord Kitchener, in a dispatch from Pretoria, dated June 4th, says:

"Dixon's report of the fighting at Vlakfontein, forty miles from Johannesburg, May 29th, just received. On our side 1450 men with seven guns were engaged. The force was returning to camp at Vlakfontein, when the enemy, under cover of a veldt, fired, rushed the rear guard consisting of two guns of the Twenty-eighth, and 330 men of the Derbyshires, and the yeomanry. They temporarily captured the two guns. When the remainder of the force came into action the Boers were driven off and the guns recaptured, and the Boers position was occupied. Our casualties were six officers and 51 men killed, six officers and 115 men wounded and one officer and seven men missing. One officer and four men have since died of wounds. Forty-one Boers were killed on the ground. The further Boer casualties are not known. Reinforcements are being sent."

WILL PROBABLY NEED A FRIEND

Carnegie Predicts a Combine Against England—She Will Turn to Us For Help.

LONDON, June 4.—"Mark my words," said Andrew Carnegie tonight to a representative of the Associated Press, "the time is coming when the continental powers will combine to smash up this little island of Great Britain. When that happens she will have to turn to the United States for help. I feel certain it will not be refused. The United States will step in and say 'don't.' They will act just as Great Britain did in the Spanish-American war. What she did then was great, and it is not half realized yet."

Mr. Carnegie gave utterance to these sentiments in the L-nghelm hotel, London, where he had arrived from Scotland for the chamber of commerce gathering. Until tonight he had steadfastly refused to be interviewed. Resuming the topic of Anglo-American relations, Mr. Carnegie said:

"I believe in the community of the English-speaking race, by which I mean that the Americans and British are now closer than ever before. Could you get a better instance than the visit of the delegates of the New York Chamber of Commerce to Windsor last Saturday? I suggested it, and King Edward took up the idea thoroughly. It was a fitting commencement of the new reign.

"I know how deeply interested King Edward is in the United States. I have known this since the time, years ago, when I drove him on a locomotive in the United States, which, by the way, he did not forget when we met under different conditions.

"The idea that the visit of our delegates to Windsor can be in any way construed as King Edward's recognition of American commercial superiority is all nonsense. The king is full of tact, and of friendship for our country."

"Do you think," Mr. Carnegie was asked, "that British enterprise can be sufficiently stimulated to meet American competition?"

"Oh, they can't compete with us," re-

plied Mr. Carnegie, with a smile. "Would you advise the British people to place their faith in combinations?" said the interviewer.

"I'm out of business," responded Mr. Carnegie, "and I know nothing about combinations."

When questioned regarding his recent gift to the universities of Scotland, he said: "Everything will be settled in a way satisfactory to both parties. The high Scotch officials and myself are still having conferences to arrange matters."

When asked if he contemplated further gifts, he replied in the negative, adding:

"I have quite enough on my hands for the present. When this matter has been settled, there will be time enough to think of something else."

No Extra Session.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The cabinet today unanimously decided that existing conditions do not warrant the calling of an extra session of congress this summer. Secretary Root and Attorney-General Knox both rendered legal opinions to the effect that the authority to govern the Philippines vested in the president by the Spooner amendment is ample. These opinions were concurred in by all the members of the cabinet.

The decision of the cabinet was announced after the cabinet meeting in the following statement issued by Secretary Cortelyou:

"The president has determined that existing conditions do not acquire or warrant calling congress together during the present summer or making any change in the policy hitherto pursued announced in regard to the Philippines."

Mrs. McKinley's Condition is No Better

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Dr. Rixey called at the White House this morning at a quarter of 9 o'clock and remained about half an hour. It is reported that Mrs. McKinley passed a fairly comfortable night, but her condition this morning shows no improvement. Dr. Johnston, Sternberg and Rixey were in consultation over an hour at the White House this forenoon. At 11:40 Secretary Cortelyou gave out the following statement:

"Mrs. McKinley's physicians report that she has had a comfortable night and that her condition has not materially changed since yesterday."
