THE REVISION IS ADVOCATED

Opponents of High Tariff Heard at Convention—Arguments For and Against Commercial Reciprocity—Proceedings of the Doctors' Convention.

DETROIT, June 5.—Commercial reciprocity was the theme which the Manufacturers' National Association discussed tonight. Widely divergent views were expressed at times, but when self-interests were laid aside and the good of the manufacturers of the country was considered in the aggregate, the delegates were agreed that reciprocity was the only means by which the foreign trade of the American manufacturer could be safeguarded.

During the discussion of the president's report, General W. S. Withington, of Jackson, Mich., said he thought the business men of the country and not the politicians should have the most to say about the tariff laws. He was in favor of tariff revision, although he had hitherto been in favor of a high tariff.

W. L. Saunders, vice-president of the Ingersoll-Sergeant Drill Company, of New York, agreed with General Withington. He said a high tariff was not only unnecessary, but a hindrance and a danger to our business. "Our Russian sugar controversy," said he, "shows how we may be legislated against by other nations."

T. S. Barnett, head of the Barnett Leather Company, said leather men wanted free hides, enabling them to bring raw material into the United States and ship out finished leather.

James S. Taylor said that while American manufacturers were clamoring for the open door in China, they should not shut the doors of the United States.

A resolution declaring section 5 of the Dingley tariff law, relating to the assessment of countervailing duties on Russian sugars, inimical to the best interests of this country, and asking congress to repeal or modify it, was passed.

A resolution requiring congress to prohibit free distribution of black-leg virus to cattle dealers provoked a long and hot discussion. It was finally made to read that the National association disapproves of the United States government entering into the manufacture of any article which has passed the experimental stage for distribution.

Unique Demand of Workmen.

CHICAGO, June 4.—For the first time in the history of Chicago unionists, a labor body is about to present the unique demand that its employers' organization shall demand. The International Association of Machinists, through its general officers, will insist on the dissolution of the Chicago Association of Machinery Manufacturers after Thursday until the members of that organization show some disposition to settle with their striking machinists. More than 2000 of the latter are now out and supported by the working union members, who are determined to compel local employers to come to terms. Five large manufacturing concerns, employing nearly 200 members of the Machinists' union, have withdrawn from the Chicago Machinery Manufacturers' association. Four of the firms included have already signed agreements with the officers of the union, despite the resolutions passed by the association binding them to refrain from arbitration with their employees. The firms which have withdrawn from the association are Winslow Brothers, Gallagher & Shack, Otton & Prince, Herman Strube & Co. and the Garden City Fan company.

Rudyard Kipling's Latest.

LONDON, June 5.—The Times publishes a stirring poem by Rudyard Kipling, entitled "Bridge Guard in the Kaaroo." It describes the dreary monotony of troops guarding lines of communication. Picturing the arrival of a train the poet says:

"Quick ere the gift escapes us,
Out of the darkness we reach
For a handful of week-old papers
And a mouthful of human speech."

The concluding verse is as follows:

"More than a little lonely,
Where the lessening tail lights
shine;
No, not combatant only;
Only detail guarding the line."

Was Not Poisoned.

NEW YORK, June 5.—The report of George A. Ferguson, an analytical chemist who made an examination of the stomach of the Rev. E. S. Phillips, of Hazleton, Pa., who was found dead in the apartments of Dr. Kirk Stanley, three weeks ago, shows that Father Phillips was not poisoned.

Stanley was arraigned before the coroner today. As soon as Stanley was arraigned Coroner Bausch said that his hope to hear that the dead priest was not poisoned had been realized, and it gave him much pleasure to release

Stanley from custody. He said the shadow had been removed from over Stanley, and he could now go his way. He declared the man discharged.

Stanley shook hands with the coroner, his counsel and the assistant district attorney and witnesses and left the courthouse.

To Exclude Consumptives.

NEW YORK, June 5.—The order of Superintendent of Immigration T. V. Powderly received by Thos. Fitchie, the commissioner of immigration for this port, that tuberculosis of the lungs is to be considered a dangerous contagious disease, is expected to result in a large decrease in the number of immigrants admitted to this country. Heretofore immigrants having tuberculosis of the lungs have been admitted unless the disease was in an advanced stage. The new ruling makes the deportation of all immigrants having tuberculosis of the lungs compulsory. It will necessitate a more strict examination for the disease by the surgeons at Ellis island, and the steamship companies will have to make examinations in Europe before accepting steerage passengers.

Memorial to Victoria.

NEW YORK, June 5.—There is talk, says the Tribune special from London, about an organized effort to raise money for an American memorial to Queen Victoria along the roadway of the Mall. A committee can easily be formed from the delegates attending the chamber of commerce dinner tonight which will manage the matter in a most satisfactory way. They are in a right mood for taking up the scheme and making the weight of their millions felt in bringing about good feeling between America and England.

Awful Siberian Massacre.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 5.—A report from Siberia tells of a horrible massacre in a little village on the Yanezei river. Two thousand Russian peasants attacked the Tartar village of Izbeek and killed 800 inhabitants. Men, women and children, it is said, were brutally killed in revenge for horse killing. Practically nobody escaped. Some were beaten to death, others thrown into the river, still others hanged, and the village razed to the ground. Troops restored order finally, and arrested hundreds of the attacking peasants.
