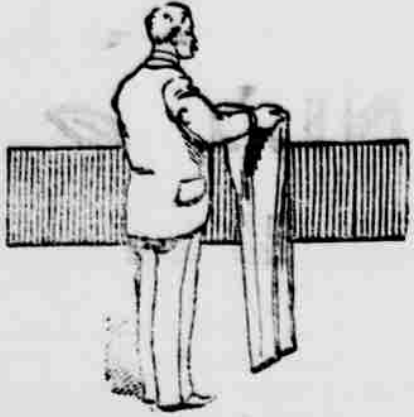

We are glad the supreme court decided right, says the Brooklyn Eagle, speaking of the recent decisions. Otherwise it might have been put in a position, by re-enforcements, to reverse its course. We would it had decided right by a larger majority. But one suffices for effect, and carries effect to the full. A tribunal, too largely affected by reactionary intellects, will be freshened from time to time with contemporary blood in the order of nature. This nation is too gratified at the affirmation of its purpose to be impressed by the narrow escape of the court from the consequences of the error of trying to arrest that purpose. The decisions of Monday informally annul the infamous Dred Scott decision, which was the reliance of the reactionaries. The judges that annulled that decree for slavery and against the inherent power of nationality wrote themselves a large fame. The judges that feared to do so created for themselves need of a large forbearance—and shall have it.

The Puget Sound Lumberman thus disposes of a very improbable, not to say impossible scheme, all the foundation for which rested on newspaper talk: The statement that the Robertson Raft Company would build and tow a raft of logs from the Columbia river to China has been copied at home and abroad. It reminds one of the Irish lawyer, defending a man on the charge of murder. The lawyer told the court that he would establish three facts: First, that his client was dead drunk at the time of the murder; second, that at the time of the murder his client was miles from the place where it was said to have been committed; third, there was no murder committed. Now after all that has been printed and the danger to navigation thoroughly ventilated, Captain Robertson makes the statement that his company never intended to tow a raft of logs to China.

The Portland Oregonian cribbs from the Spokesman-Review a list of somewhat forceful and accurately descriptive expressions used by the Post-Intelligencer in describing the Oregonian's brutal assault on Mrs. McKinley. These it seems to consider as a sort of "offset." Let us illustrate. A street-corner loafer addresses indecent remarks to a lady passing by. A friend of the lady's husband, happening to be near, chastises the wretch and probably uses his tongue as well as his boot. The castigated vagabond swears lustily. Yet the two men are scarcely on the same moral plane. That, however, is not true of the Portland and the Spokane newspapers. They are twin brothers in thought and method, and sympathy flows as natural between them as bilge-water from the lower hold to the pump.—Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

A Sherman county paper contains a personal relating to the wife of a

prominent Sherman county banker, in which the lady, who is now on a visit to the Emerald Isle, is made to say in a letter that "nothing short of paradise can compare with Ireland." The editor, who must have smelt the peat reek himself, on its native heath as it were, accounts for this predilection for the tight little isle by saying that "the smell of the potheen is answerable for this; it casts an indescribable glamor over foreign visitors to the land of potatoes and whiskey."

It is the lot of the real newspaper men and women of Oregon to be grinding out copy for the printers while the journalists of the state are gallivanting towards Buffalo to attend the alleged National Editorial Association, in which real editors are as scarce as hens' teeth.

NOTICE TO WATER-CONSUMERS.

All persons using Dalles City water for irrigating purposes between the 1st day of May and the 1st day of September, will observe the following rules and regulations:

Persons will be permitted to use the water below the bluff on all even days, and above the bluff on all odd days from 6 o'clock a. m. until 8 a. m., and from 6 o'clock p. m. until 8 p. m.

The above rules must be strictly complied with, and any infraction of the above rules will subject the offender to a fine of \$1, and the water will be shut off until paid; and for a second offence double the amount.

The following charges will be made: For one full lot 50x100, \$1.50 per month. Each additional lot \$1.25; half lot 75 cts.

All persons using water in closet or toilet will see to it that the water is shut off when not in use, or water will be shut off altogether if allowed to run to waste.
