The Lutheran Sunday school will have an excursion tomorrow to Hood River, leaving The Dalles by boat at 7 o'clock in the morning.

A carload of fine steers, belonging to Harry Gippin, were shipped from the stock yards last night to Troutdale. They averaged 1200 pounds each.

The coming Fourth will be celebrated at Lyle, under the auspices of the Modern Woodmen of that place. The celebration will be held in the grove near the boat landing.

The river is still falling at The Dalles, as it is at all points from which there is any report in the daily river bulletin. The fall here in twenty-four hours is eight-tenths of a foot.

George Carr, a logger from down the river, was arrested last night by Officer Paulsen and this morning pleaded guilty to a charge of drunk and disorderly before Recorder Gates. He paid a fine of \$3.

Employees of the White Collar Line today droye a lot of piles in the river near the place where the Bailey Gatzert is accustomed to land. These will be used for a landing till the river reaches a lower stage.

Yakima Indians brought across the river, this morning, about 400 head of cayuses which they sold to the Linton Cannery Company at \$2.50 a head. They were mostly a very scrawny lot that the reservation range is well rid of.

From Sam Thurman, who was in Hood River yesterday, we learn that while he was there a lady resident of the city, Mrs. Strause, was hit in the face with a baseball that some young fellows were carelessly playing with on the public street, and severely injured, being rendered unconscious for a time.

Last Friday morning Attorney Sam Stark received a letter from J. D. Davoport asking him to come to Mosier at once, as he wanted to see him at his home at 7:30 p. m. Samuel was at home at the date mentioned and patiently awaiting his client, when at about 8 in came about thirty young people and reminded him that his birthday had once more rolled around. After playing many interesting games, strawberries and cream were served, and later the merry crowd dispersed leaving Samuel with many presents and well aware of the fact that he is one year older. Sam got back from Mosier yesterday.

Four arrests have been made of young men suspected of complicity in the assault and robbery committed on Shin Sing, the Chinaman, on Mill creek Saturday night. These are Marshal Denton, J. C. Craig, Dan Daffron Jr., and Lewis Jones. Craig is an employe at the L. A. Porter livery stable. Justice Brownhill placed him under bonds of \$500 to appear for examination Thursday. The bonds were furnished by Mr. Porter, and Craig has employed W. H. Wilson to defend him. In default of \$500 bonds each, Daffron and Jones are in jail awaiting examination. Denton is having his examination in Justice Brownhill's court as we go to press, with Judge Bennett for the defense and F. W. Wilson for the prosecution.

Jake Prah, who killed Dan Maloney in this city some five or six years ago, was himself shot, but not dangerously, at Glenwood last Sunday afternoon, by a young man named Billy McGrath. From the best information at hand it appears that the shooting occurred over a dispute about range. Prah has a flock of sheep on the range, and young McGrath, it is said, warned Prah that there would be trouble if he brought the sheep on the lands of McGrath's stepfather any more. Prah renewed the offense and McGrath fired at him with a shot gun loaded with buck shot, one shot taking effect in Prah's hip. It is said Prah did some shooting himself, but whether as the aggressor or otherwise could not be learned. Prah arrived at Goldendale Monday evening, where an unsuccessful effort was made to extract the bullet.

### St. Martin's Springs.

A Union county paper says there is a well-confirmed rumor that the Hot Lake springs, in Union county, recently changed hands at the handsome price of \$65,000. This reminds us that we have hot springs within a few hours ride by boat from The Dalles that, it is hardly extravagant to say, are the equal in curative power of any springs on the Pacific coast, if not on the continent. We refer to St. Martin's springs, in Skamania county. Rumor has it that not long since an offer of \$40,000 was tendered for these springs and promptly refused, as the owners have no desire or intention of selling the property.

Many of the cures effected at St. Martin's are marvelous to relate. A lady who lately returned from a two-weeks sojourn there, who went to the springs weak and emaciated from a protracted illness, came back in robust health and with the appetite of a plowman. While she was there as many as forty-two persons from all points of the compass were inmates of the hotel and were using the water. She tells of a Portland lady who at first had to be carried to the bath in a litter and helped in and out, who, after three weeks use of the water, was able to climb the steep hill from the hotel to the springs without assistance. A big Swede, who had been helping to float the light ship down at Fort Canby, came there with rheumatism "in every bone in his body," as he expressed it, and almost helpless as a child, in a few days was able to walk about with little difficulty. People come there every day on crutches and litters, who, after drinking the water and bathing in it a few times, were almost invariably benefited. Taking the water internally acts as a powerful tonic and creates an appetite that makes the homeliest and coarsest fare sweet and palatable.

The accommodations at the hotel are as good as in most ordinary second-class hotels, the table being supplied with an abundance of plain, wholesome, well-cooked food, and the charges are quite reasonable, only \$1.25 a day for everything. Every visitor to the springs comes away with a kindly word for George Drescher, a sort of clerk and man-of-all-work, an obliging, genial young man, who is at the beck and call of every visitor and who never seems to weary in considerate and kindly attentions to all who need his services.

The owners of the springs have never spent a dollar in advertising the virtues of the waters, and most likely never will, but if these springs were a thousand miles away and were a little better known, they would be looked upon by the people of Oregon and Washington as one of the wonders of the Pacific coast, if not of the continent.

### Dalles Ex-Postmaster in Luck.

It is better to be lucky than a Dalles postmaster. H. H. Riddell, whom a jury of his countrymen recently ac-

quitted of a serious crime, has just won for a client an action at law that will, in all probability, put the snug sum of \$100,000 in the ex-postmaster's pocket. The case is that of T. J. Brown and B. W. Maddox against the Oregon King Mining Company, which was decided Saturday at Portland in favor of the plaintiff's who were Riddell's clients.

Months ago, as the story is, Brown and Maddox consulted Riddell with reference to the action at law for the recovery of their mine, now known as the Oregon King, near the little town of Ashwood, in northern Crook, and believed to be worth a half million of dollars. The mine was at that time undeveloped, and none of the parties named had any conception of its value. Riddell offered to take the case for half of what could be made out of it; that is to say, for a half interest in the mine. Riddell took into partnership Attorney Albert Abraham, of Portland, and after a trial that lasted nearly a week, the mine is declared the property of Brown & Maddox, which means that Riddell & Abraham are owners of the half of it.

The case will, of course, be carried up to the higher courts, but Riddell has the advantage of having the first decision in his favor, and there is a strong probability that he will have the last one.
