ACCEPTED BY CUBA

Platt Amendment Now a Part of the Constitution—Vote Was 16 to 11.

HAVANA, June 12.—The Cuban constitutional convention today accepted the Platt amendment by a vote of 16 to 11. The resolution to adopt was carried without discussion. Immediately after the opening of the session, Senors Tamayo, Villuendas and Quesada, constituting a majority of the committee on relations, submitted, as a substitute for the committee's former report, the Platt amendment as passed by congress, recommending that it be made an appendix to the constitution. In the vote on the resolution the twenty-seven delegates present divided as follows:

In favor of acceptance—Senors Capote, Villuendas, Jose M. Gamez, Tamayo, Montesquedo, Delago, Betancourt, Giberga, Lorente, Quesada, Sanguilly, Nunez, Rodriguez, Berriel, Quilez and Ferrer.

Opposed to acceptance—Senors Zayas, Aleman, Eudaldo Tamayo, Juan Gualberto Gomez, Cieneros, Silvela, Fortun, Lacret, Portuondo, Castro and Mandaley.

Senors Rivera, Corterosa, Gener and Robau were absent. The latter two voted against acceptance in the previous division. Senor Ferrer voted with the conservatives, explaining his change of attitude by asserting that he believed the acceptance would be the best solution of the problem. The convention will now appoint a committee to draw up the electoral law.

Satisfied With Experiment.

NEW YORK, June 12.—A special to the Tribune from Montreal says: Warren F. Purdy, manager of the Northwestern Steamship Company of Chicago, who is in town, says that the company is satisfied with its venture in having ships plying directly between Chicago and Great Britain by way of the St. Lawrence route. There is \$1,000,000 invested in the four steamers already running and two more are to be constructed immediately. Mr. Purdy says that he is satisfied that the announcement that the dominion government that there is 14 feet of clear water in the St. Lawrence canal, is well founded, as on the voyage of the Northtown, which has just come through, he held the tape himself and found a minimum depth of more than fourteen feet. Mr. Purdy predicts that other Chicago shipping firms will follow the lead set by his company, and expects to see half a dozen different lines plying direct between Chicago and Europe. There is, in his opinion, an astonishing future before the St. Lawrence waterway.

Instantly Killed.

HILLSBORO, June 12.—Stephen Holcomb, who resides near Phillips, this county, was yesterday accidentally shot by a gopher gun and instantly killed. During late years, Mr. Holcomb had spent most of his time in capturing gophers, and in loading the gun yesterday it was accidentally discharged, the bullet taking effect in the left temple.

Deceased was born in Ohio in 1822, and came to Oregon in 1845, where he was married to Miss Amanda Lee in 1850, and has resided in this country ever since. He was one of the first directors of the first school organized in Washington county, and deceased and Isaac Butler, of this city, were the only survivors of the first organizers of the school. Deceased was a veteran of the Cayuse war of 1847-8, and was well known throughout the state, having resided on the old homestead since soon after arriving in Oregon.

Mrs. Holcomb, six sons and daughter survive him. The funeral will take place tomorrow, and the remains interred in the West Union Cemetery, near the family home.

Arapahoe Indians Making Trouble.

HELENA, Mont., June 12.—A special from Red Lodge, Mont., says that serious trouble is threatened with the Arapahoe Indians, on the Shoshone reservation, in Wyoming. The Indians have openly defied the authorities, and are preparing for the barbarous sun dance. The state militia has been ordered to the scene.

LEGISLATURE ENDS

Three Washington Bills Passed Over Vetoes—Session Lasted Two Days

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 12.—The session of the Washington legislature adjourned this evening, after transacting considerable more business than that for which it was called, viz. the amendment of the capital punishment law. The most important feature of today's session was the passage of three bills vetoed by Governor Rogers subsequent to the adjournment of the regular session last Winter. The governor vetoed five bills altogether, and the senate passed all of them over his veto. Two of the five failed of passage in the house.

The amendment of the capital punishment law for which the session was originally called, was successfully accomplished. The Rands law was first repealed and then re-enacted with a saving clause which will permit the execution of criminals whose crimes have been committed heretofore, and who are under sentence to be executed under the old law. In addition to this, a general "saving clause" was passed, which expressly provides that hereafter when any criminal statute is amended or repealed by implication, that such amendment or repeal shall not apply to offenses already committed.

An amendment to the jury was also passed, which is aimed to correct the workings of that act in the larger counties of the state.

The bill to pay the expenses of the session was also passed. It carries an appropriation of \$7500.

Killed in a Runaway.

ST. ANTHONY, Idaho, June 11.—Miss Lilla Pratt, of Edmonds, Idaho, was killed, and Miss Lucas, daughter of Bishop Lucas, seriously injured in a runaway accident which occurred last night while the two young women and Bishop Lucas were returning from a drive to Exburg. In crossing a ditch, from which the culvert had been removed, the horses became frightened and ran. The occupants of the buggy were thrown out, Miss Pratt being instantly killed and Miss Lucas' leg was broken.

Two Thousand Men Out.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 12.—A special

from Newport News, Va., says: It is announced this morning that 1000 men will be laid off at the yards of the Newport News Shipbuilding & Drydock Company on account of the machinists' strike. This will make a total of 2000 men out, and it is expected that the entire plant will be closed by Saturday night.

It is the understanding here that all shipyards in the country are determined not to accede to the demands of the machinists, and that all plants where machinists have gone out will close down indefinitely rather than grant the demands.

It Means Cuban Independence.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 12.—Secretary of War Root tonight was shown the associated press dispatch from Havana announcing the adoption of the Platt amendment by the Cuban constitutional convention. He said:

"If the Cuban convention has adopted the Platt amendment, it has done the wisest and most patriotic thing possible for Cuba. It means the independence of Cuba and all that is best and freest in Cuba will be backed by all that is best in the United States."

When Secretary of State Hay read the dispatch he said:

"As an old friend of Cuban independence for the last thirty years, I am most gratified to learn that the Cuban convention has done what is so clearly to the advantage of the Cuban people."
