**OFFENSE OUTLAWED**

Oregon Cannot Punish School Clerk Davis—Opinion of Judge Hamilton—Statute of Limitations Has Run Against the Embezzlement by Davis of About \$31,000 of the State's Funds.

SALEM, June 13.—Circuit Judge J. W. Hamilton, of the second district, who is holding court here in the place of Judge Burnett, today advised the grand jury that the statute of limitations has run against the crime of embezzlement committed by George W. Davis in failing to turn over \$31,000 of school funds, received by him as clerk of the state land board. The grand jury presented the facts to Judge Hamilton yesterday and asked for his opinion. This proceeding was taken under a statute which authorizes the grand jury to state the facts of a case, using fictitious names, so that the judge may advise them as to the law. The statement of facts was as follows:

"The grand jury of Marion county, Or., duly and regularly empaneled by said court for its June term, 1901, hereby present to the above entitled court and to your honor the following statement of facts which we have under consideration, and request your honor to advise us as to whether or not the person hereinafter named has violated the criminal statutes of the state of Oregon, and, if so, whether or not said crime is barred by the statute of limitations.

"We find that 'John Doe' was the duly appointed, qualified and acting clerk of the board of commissioners for the sale of school and university lands and for the investment of the funds arising therefrom of the state of Oregon, from August 1, 1891, to July 31, 1895.

"That during said time the said 'John Doe' embezzled and converted to his own use moneys belonging to the school fund of the state of Oregon, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$30,952.06.

"That the said embezzlement and conversion to his own use occurred at different times during the term of office of said 'John Doe.' That the date of the first embezzlement, as appears from the records of said office, was on January 1, 1892, and the date of the last embezzlement, as appears from the records of said office, was on July 1, 1894.

"That on July 31, 1895, 'Richard Doe' was duly appointed and qualified as the successor in office to the said 'John Doe,' and on said date the said 'John Doe' turned the books and papers of said office and money belonging to the above-named funds over to his successor in office, except the aforesaid sum of \$30,952.06, which said sum said 'John Doe' failed, neglected and refused to turn over to his said successor, and still has the same in his possession.

"That said conversion was not discovered until about February 15, 1901, on account of the false and fraudulent entries made in the books kept by said 'John Doe.'

"That the said 'John Doe' has been a resident of Marion county continuously since the date of said embezzlement until about the month of February, 1901."

In passing upon the question, Judge Hamilton did not state whether the statute began to run from the time of the taking of the money or from the time the clerk went out of office, for in either event the crime would be outlawed. It is nearly six years since Davis went out of office, and the crime outlawed in three years. There will be no further proceedings of a criminal nature against Davis, for nothing would be accomplished thereby.

**ROBBING THE GOVERNMENT**

Gigantic Frauds Unearthed in the Army in San Francisco—Several Dealers Are Arrested.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—General Shafter and Colonel Maus, inspector general of the department of California, and the federal grand jury are investigating many reports of frauds committed in the commissary branch of the army service in this city. That these reports seem to be based on something more substantial than idle rumor is evidenced by the disclosures following the arrest of Louis Abram & Son, dealers in second hand clothing. Captain Seymour, of the local detective force, said today:

"The government has unquestionably been robbed for a long time past, and I believe the amount of the losses sustained will reach into the hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Major General Shafter admitted that thefts of clothing have been going on. He claimed there was no shortage in any department, however.

For months past various stores about the city have been exhibiting signs: "Government goods for sale here," and advertisements have been crowded into the daily newspapers. This morning the following advertisement appeared: "Wanted—1000 men to wear government shoes; \$1 paid; 923 Howard street."

Inspector General Maus and a number of local detectives began, some days ago, an investigation which resulted in the arrest of Louis Abram and his son, George, for buying and selling government supplies.

Three big wagon loads of goods have been taken to the hall of justice, and in every instance the men from whom they were seized have admitted buying the goods from Abram & Son. It is also stated that 200,000 pounds of grain has been stolen.

This afternoon Captain Seymour stated that the government's officers had discovered large quantities of goods stolen from the government. The goods were stored in a warehouse south of Market street.

**Eaten by Cannibals.**

VICTORIA, B. C., June 13.—As the result of the publication of the stories of the presence of bubonic plague in San Francisco, Dr. Ashburton Thompson, quarantine officer at Sydney, refused to the wharf at the New South Wales port, according to news brought by the Miowers, which arrived today.

From Guinea news was received via Sydney of the massacre of Rev. James Chambers and Rev. B. F. Tomkins and fourteen native teachers by cannibals. The whites were eaten.

The scene of the cannibal orgie was seen by troops sent out to investigate the massacre, and a portion of a jaw and thigh bones of the missionaries were found, together with their hats and portions of trousers which belonged to Chalmers. The expedition punished the natives, destroying their villages and canoes. Some prisoners were taken during an attack made by the natives on the troops who told the awful tale of the massacres.
