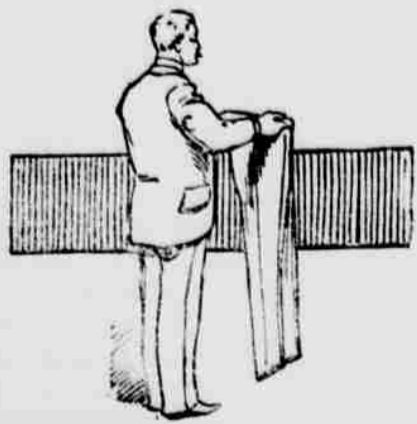

A CRYING-OUT NUISANCE.

At the moment when a city election is fresh in the memory of the people of The Dalles it is pertinent to call attention to a provision of the city charter that each succeeding city election for the past ten years has, to a greater or less extent, proved to be pernicious and subversive of good government. We refer to the clause that places the selection of the marshal and recorder in the hands of the mayor, by and with the consent of the city council. The CHRONICLE has no thought of criticising the official acts of any marshal or recorder that has ever been appointed in this manner. It is no thought of comparing them with others that the city has chosen by popular vote. They may have been better or worse for aught that concerns us at this moment.

The one fact that is open and notorious in connection with the present method is that in nominating a mayor and council and in voting for them their qualifications are too frequently ignored and they are supported according as they are understood to be in favor of or opposed to the appointment of certain persons for marshal or recorder. Hence it has come to pass that in a very true sense as regards a large number of voters the ballots are not cast so much for the mayor and councilmen as for the men they are supposed to be in favor of for these two appointive offices.

Thus the interests of the city are lost sight of by many voters and made subservient to the much less important consideration: Who shall be marshal or recorder? Then when the election is over the mayor-elect is besieged with petitions asking for this or that one's appointment to these offices, and these petitions are, like all other petitions, frequently signed merely to get rid of an importunate applicant and are in no sense an evidence of the applicant's fitness for the office he seeks nor a witness that the signers desire him to get the office. In some cases it is merely a question of who has the longest petition; in other words, who has done the most rustling to get signatures. The whole business is a sham and fraud and nuisance, and the charter ought to be amended at the first opportunity so as to again place the election of marshal and recorder in the hands of the people, where it belongs.

The Pendleton East Oregonian of last Monday devotes its entire editorial space in an effort to impress the minds of Eastern Oregon "business men, bankers, farmers, professional men, business women, laborers, all," with the imperative need for the permanent improvement of our big natural water thoroughfare, the Columbia river. It calls attention to the increased value that has been added to every pound of farm products marketed at The Dalles by

reason of the construction and opening of the Cascade locks, and insists that the members of the house committee on rivers and harbors, who will soon visit this section, should be met by courteously insistent business men whose one object should be to send the committee back to Washington with the idea firmly implanted in their minds that the people of Eastern Oregon are determined upon having an open river, and that the men or party that refuses this just demand will hear from the people at the first opportunity in no uncertain tones.

Tickets on sale at The Dalles July 15th and 16th, and will be honored by Southern Pacific on trains leaving Portland July 15th and 16th, and on morning train July 17th; good for return passage leaving San Francisco up to and including July 31, 1901. Tickets will not be sold good in one direction via rail and in another via steamer.

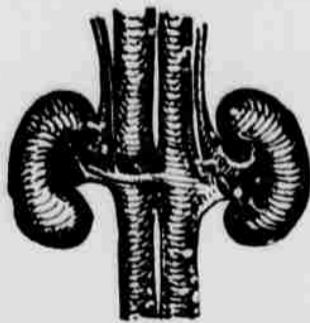

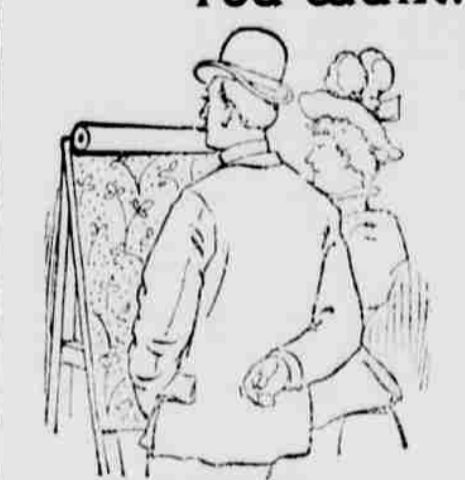
