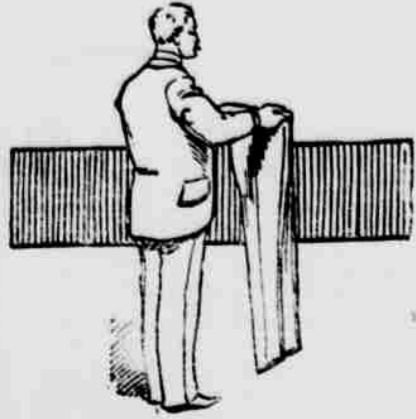

R. & N. and Southern Pacific, first class, good for stop-overs in California, \$28.50. Second class, including berth in tourist sleeper in both directions, no stop-overs, \$25.50. 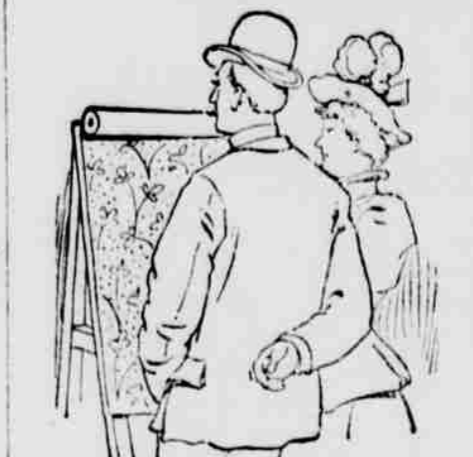
